BOARD OF TRADE MEETING.

Called Together Last Evening to Act on Various Matters.

The board of trade, of Heppner, met at 8 o'clock last evening to consider various matters of importance. The president, Geo. Conser, presided, and in the absence of the secretary, S. S. Horner, Otis Patterson was appointed to act in that capacity for the meeting.

A communication from Surveyor White, of Grant county, suggesting that he should accompany the appraisers on the Parrish creek road, etc., was read and on motion of Henry Heppner, prop only seconded, it was decided to send Mr. White to Wagner to meet the appraisers on Dec. 2.

The chair appointed Thos. Morgan to be at Wagner on Dec. 2, and to accompany appraisers as a representative of Heppner's board of trade.

Mr. E. G. Sperry was not present, but Mr. Oscar Minor reported for him that little had been done towards securing the right-of-way or settling damages, but one settlement having been made. His found, however, that he needed the assistance of the appraisers and surveyors to accomplish much.

The acting secretary was appointed to notify Mr. White at once that his services will be required.

On motion of Morgan, properly seconded, a committee of three was appointed to draft constitution and by-laws, and to secure permanent membership under said constitution and by-laws. The chair appointed Thos. Morgan, Frank Gilliam and Otis Patterson.

On motion of Morgan, fees for membership were put at \$2; dues 50 cents quarterly.

Adjourned.
