The Pendleton Post Office Robber Evades the Officers.

The search for the robber who held postmaster Johnson and looted the postoffice on Monday evening at Pendleton has so far proved futile. Notice whatever has been discovered. All outgoing trains were closely watched, and no suspicious character was seen to board any of them. From the investigation it appears to be probable that the robber is still in the city or that, immediately after the deed, he found a place of concealment in the country.

Postmaster Johnson, was at his office Wednesday with his left hand in a sling. He had been up his neck as nearly as he could, and said the total amount of money stolen was about \$100.

Monday morning Sheriff Hovver arrested E. S. Wood, a lawyer of Weiser, Idaho, on suspicion, taking him out of the Hotel Pendleton. However, Wood was shortly afterwards released, as Johnson failed to see in him any semblance of the robber.

Sheriff Harrington, of this county, received the following minute description of the robber:

Small man, about 5 feet 8 inches, weight about 150 or 160, dark complexioned, dark mustache and dark beard about one inch long, wearing dark chinchilla overcoat with velvet collar, and rather wide rimmed dark hat pretty well worn, and that he was riding a small slim built bay horse with short tail, locks like might be a race horse. Robber took about \$500 in gold, about \$150 in silver, and some bills, among the bills was one \$2 bill and one \$5 bill, one Canadian 50 cent piece, two Canadian 25 cent pieces, one Mexican \$1 and one mashed or battered 25 cent piece. Watch all suspicious characters, arrest and wire.

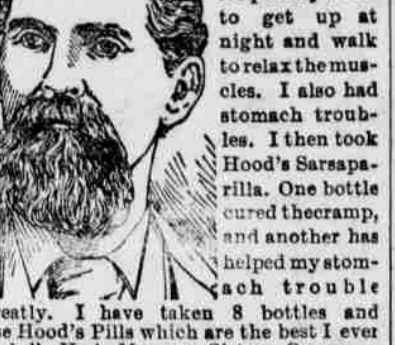
