MONTGOMERY HANGED. Boy Murderer Met His Fate Bravely

ALBANY, Ore., Jan. 31 - Lloyd Bryson Montgomery, the self-confessed murderer of his father and mother and D. Mc-Kercher, was hanged at 7 o'clock this morning in the enclosure of the jail yard. The prisoner exhibited wonderful pluck, and did not flinch upon the scaffold. About half an hour before the execution Montgomery said he would confess all. NEGLECTED. SHABBILY TREATED NERVES "I am guilty," he said, "I killed them all. I will write it out." He then wrote out the following statement:

"I did it, I am guilty, Oh God. have mercy on me. Take me as I am, s poor sinner. I am sorry for what I have done; God, do have mercy on my soul -for my sake do, and forgive all my sins each and every one of them, and forgive those who sined against me. Oh God, belp precious souls to see the way of life; for my sake do help them, and guide them through this life Amen." As he left for the scaffold he said: 'I want you people to know I am sorry for what I have done. I am ready to die. I deserve it."

After stepping upon the platform, Montgomery said: "Friends, I am sorry for what I have done, and I hope you will all forgive me, and I hope the Lord will be with you, and I ask God to have mercy on me as a poor sinner, and I ask

only a slight tremor. The head was bent forward and to one side, and the neck was broken. At fourteen and ahalf minutes the heart ceased to beat, and at sixteen-and a-half minutes be was pronounced dead. The body was then cut down. It will be placed in the court bouse for a short time, and will be turned over to doctors for an autopsy before burisl. His relatives refused to take possession of the body or bury it.
