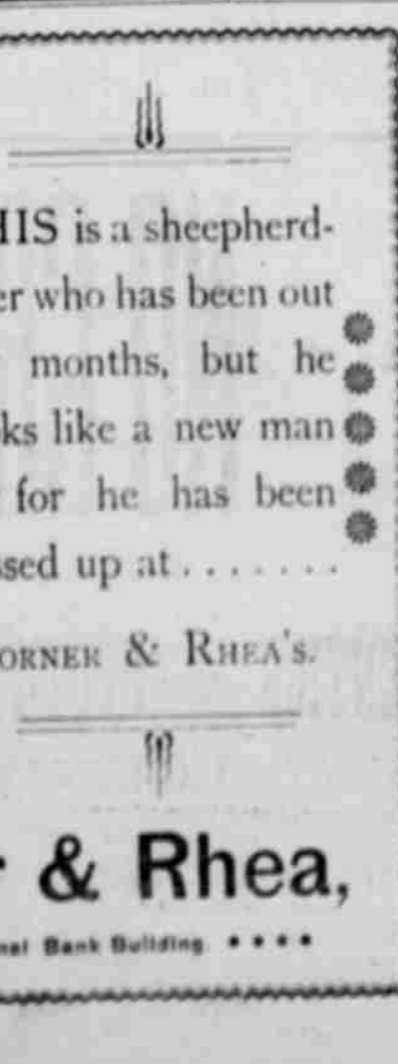

A HEPPNER HOLD-UP.

J. C. Hart, the Ticket and Express Agent at Depot held up Last Evening. Evidently Amateur.

Last night shortly before 10 o'clock Fred Hart came rushing up town with just enough breath left to give the mesger information that his father, J. C. Hart, the O. R. & N. ticket, express agent and operator at the depot, had been held up by two masked men and relieved of all the freight and express money in the safe. A reporter of this paper shortly afterwards reached the scene of the robbery when he was informed that the above report was true and that the agent had been relieved of from \$50 to \$60. Agent Hart gave the particulars as follows: Shortly after 9 o'clock Jack Lake, the brakeman, came in and informed him that he met some suspicious fellows as he came down and had noticed that they were looking in the window before he reached them. Mrs. Hart, who was also in the office, heard them around the building and as some one approached heard them run away. But a moment afterwards two masked men rushed into the office and at the point of two very angry looking revolvers ordered Mr. Hart to open the safe and give them the money and be—quick about it. Mr. Hart was a little slow in responding when they again informed him in language more forcible than beautiful to hurry up. Mrs. Hart was ordered to hold up her hands, but instead of doing so passed quickly out of the rear door, thinking she could call Brakeman Lake, who was at the coach a short distance below, but before they had returned, the money had been delivered and the unwelcome visitors gone.

The following is a brief description of the robbers as given by Mr. Hart: One was a tall slim man, dressed in black suit with outwavy coat and black cap. The other a low heavy set man dressed in brown suit, sack coat and soft black hat. Both wore black masks.
Early this morning the robbers were tracked up toward town. Not far from the depot a black hat, thought to have been worn by one was found and in the creek near by a mackintosh coat, though the latter was probably not worn by either of the robbers. At the corner of the lower warehouses, the money drawer was found and also \$175 scattered on the ground where the box had been relieved of its contents. From the tracks it is evident that three parties were interested. The third party probably stood guard on the outside while the other two executed the hold up.
In all the work appears to be that of novices or amateur robbers. It was badly planned and nervously carried out. It is reported that several parties are suspected and some arrests will probably be made.

DEATH OF S. P. STURGIS.

One of Pendleton's Most Prominent Citizens Passes Away.
On last Tuesday evening at 9 o'clock at Pendleton occurred the death of S. P. Sturgis as a result of a severe attack of typhoid fever and a complication of cerebral disease. For more than a month Mr. Sturgis had been a very sick man and for many days his recovery had been given up by almost every one, and while he held out a long time, yet at last this terrible disease conquered a strong man. Sam P. Sturgis, who was one of the most widely known and by far the most influential citizen in Pendleton, had been cashier of the First National bank of that city for more than 15 years, during which period he sustained the reputation of being one of Oregon's best financiers. His name was connected with every public movement in that city, and his opinion and advice sought by many in every business undertaking. In fact his loss will undoubtedly be more keenly felt than would that of any other citizen of Unstilla county. The funeral occurred today at Walls Walls where the remains were conveyed by special train.
Sam P. Sturgis was the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Sturgis, and was born in Gorham, Maine, March 26, 1856. In 1871, he came to the Pacific coast, accompanying his parents and settled in Pendleton. In 1880, Mr. Sturgis became cashier of the First National bank of Pendleton and ever since his strong hand has guided it. He was married to Miss Hartman in 1881. From the union were three children—William P., a boy of 14, now attending Shattuck Military school at Fairmount, Minn.; and two young boys of 5 or 6, Cyrus and James H. His parents still reside in Walls Walls.

CITY ELECTION.—The city election passed off last Tuesday with the usual amount of interest and friendly strife. The change of the ballot law not being familiar to all caused several errors, and resulted in some casting their vote entirely different than intended. The total vote was slightly larger than was expected, in fact larger than for several years past, it being 219, while last year it reached 209 and in '94, 213. The count was completed early in the evening and resulted as follows: For mayor, Thos. Morgan, 111; C. C. Sargent, 85. For recorder, F. J. Hallock, 168. For treasurer, E. L. Freeland, 150. For councilmen, Geo. Conser, 163; Frank Gilliam, 141; C. A. Minor, 125; D. W. Hornor, 77; Walter Crawford, 68; W. P. Scriver, 64. A great many apparently thought it unnecessary to indicate by mark or cross their vote for recorder and treasurer as there was but one nominee for each office, consequently the vote was not counted. This accounts for the vote of each not being larger. As will be seen from the above Thos. Morgan was re-elected mayor, and Geo. Conser, Frank Gilliam and C. A. Minor selected as councilmen. The vote was telegraphed from the council chamber to Wills & Stocum's store where same was displayed in the window, in front of which a considerable crowd gathered to receive the returns.

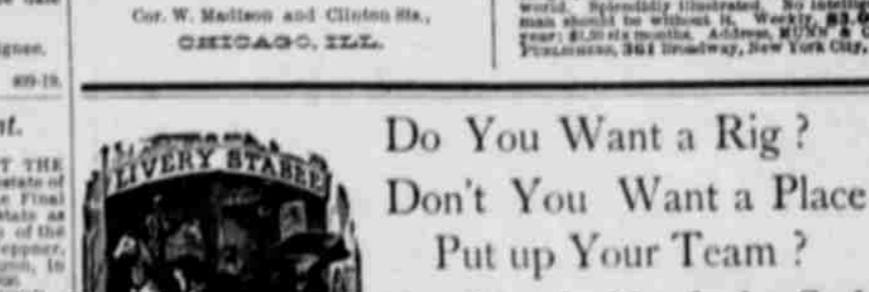
