

THE TOILERS OF PARIS.

A Near View of the Working Classes of the French Capital.

People Who Are Fond of Wine and Song and Careless About the Future - Their Feeling Toward Society.

In order to study the working classes thoroughly M. Henri Leyret, a literary man, started business as a marchand de vin, or publican, in one of the most crowded districts of Paris, says a writer in the London Telegraph. He has embodied his experiences as a mastroquet in a book entitled: "En Plein Faubourg," which has lately been published by Charpentier. M. Leyret, after having denounced the bad drink supplied to the working classes—not always through the fault of the public.

Henri Leyret, a literary always through the fault of the publicans, but, rather, due to the wholesale merchants-gives it as his opinion that those who live by the sweat of their brow have an aversion to debt. The bad payers and those who want drinks chalked up are the exception, and it is needless to say that they are the idlers, the loafers and the confirmed drunkards. These men neglect no opportunity of sponging or of obtaining drink on credit, without the least intention of paying for the absinthe or wine sup-plied to them. As a rule the laborious people avoid the taverns wherein the loafers assemble. The author also alludes to a discussion on Zola which he overheard. One of his customers, while gazing at a portrait of the novelist, maintained that the working classes had been libeled in the "Assommoir. "Is the workman," asked the anti-Zolaist, "to be represented as an eternal drunkard because he drinks a glass now and then?" The listeners applauded this speech, but another man stood up for Zola, saying that if the novelist had exaggerated a little it was done in the interest of the working classes, whose vices were to be attributed to the bourgeoisie.

M. Leyret met a confirmed absinthe drinker of a curious type. This man was one of the best carpenters in the district, and when sober was never out of work. For weeks he would refrain from touching a glass of the green fairy, but, suddenly forgetting his good resolutions, would launch forth into a carouse on his favorite beverage, never going to bed until he had swallowed twenty-four glasses of absinthe, with copious draughts of wine in between. The author notes that the average faubaurien workman is generally more given to eating than drinking. He eats meat, if possible, at luncheon and dinner, the former meal being the more substantial. He is careless about the future, and looks forward to dying straight off when he shall be no longer strong enough to toil.

Alluding to the pleasures of the people, M. Leyret is glad to state that Beranger's songs have not yet lost their charm for the tolling masses. As to he relations of the exes, the author of En Fiem Faubourg says that free unions are increasing among the workers, domestic arrangements being made on a family basis. The girls who leave their shops and factories for the Champs Elysees or the main boulevards are, however, shunned and despised by the faubouriers. M. Leyret concludes his interesting volume by some observations on the feeling of the working classes toward the anarchist and revolutionist movements in their midst. At present, he points out, material exigencies and the necessity of living keep the average workman resigned, but a desire of revenge lucks in ais breast against a society in which he has to toll without the hope of what he sonsiders an adequate reward for his services, and without any security that after a life of labor he will enjoy some repose with a moderate competency.

A Tribute to Them from the Pen of One

of England's Old Foes. The Temps has a correspondent in London who has evidently been most favorably impressed by the charms of the English ladies, says the London Daily News. Nothing could be more ridiculous, he declares, than the fancy portrait of an English woman as seen in the mind's eye of a Frenchman who knows nothing of England. Musset said: "As cold as an English woman," and the French picture her as a creature with enormous feet, a jaw like that of a gorilla, bony hands and a flat neck, wearing a round hat, a green veil, spectacles, a plaid shawl and loose, ill-fitting stockings, falling over boots like those attached to a diver's dress. PAPER CABLES. They Are Said to Be Cheaper and Better Insulated Than Rubber Ones. For many purposes paper, next to wire, is an excellent insulation, and it has of late come extensively into use in telephonic and other cables. But it is not generally known that such an insulation has been tried under water. This is, however, the fact, and one such cable is now doing excellent work at the bottom of the Hudson river, at New York, right in the track of all the domestic and sea-bound traffic. Of course, the cable is lead-covered and otherwise protected, but it depends for its insulation, electrically, on thin spirals of paper around each stranded interior wire. The laying of such a
