FACTS FOR THE FARMER.
Instead of using medicine as cathartics give the animals luscious meal regularly, which is not harmful, but, on the contrary, is a nutritious food, which is beneficial in many respects, especially to cattle and horses.
Whenever there is a bounteous fruit crop vegetables are not cared for as they should be. It is always best to have a little variety laid by for winter use, for before another crop is harvested they will be hugely appreciated.
The prices of farm implements are low compared with the past. When prices of farm produce fall, implements must be sold at a small margin of profit owing to the farmers curtailing expenses in the several departments.
Windows of poultry houses should be placed on the south or south-west side, as the warmth of the sun will enter soon in the morning. The interior of the poultry house should have plenty of light and warmth, in order to keep all portions dry and free from dampness.
Every man who contemplates going into the fruit business should first visit an experienced specialist in the particular line he is going to engage in and get all the information possible so as to start aright. This precaution may save lots of trouble, and probably avoid failure in the end.
