From our Special Correspondent.  
The river and harbor bill is now being considered by the committee on commerce of the senate.

Following upon this report by Capt. Symons, Senator Mitchell had an item placed in the last sundry civil act, providing for an examination of the harbor by a board, to consist of three officers of the engineer corps.

At the first meeting of the commerce committee, after the house passed the river and harbor bill, Senator McBride received a full broadside on this subject from the chairman of the committee, Senator Frye.
