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WHITTIER'S COURAGE.

He Haunted Life and Popularity in the Cause of Abolition. Before he was thirty he had made up his mind that it was his duty to do what he could for the relief of the unfortunate negroes who were held in bondage in the south. In 1833 he wrote a pamphlet called "Justice and Expediency," in which he considered the whole question of slavery and declared that it should cease forever. Three years later, writes Prof. Brander Matthews in St. Nicholas, he became secretary of the Anti-Slavery Society. In 1838 he went to Philadelphia to edit the Pennsylvania Freeman; and so boldly did he advocate the right of the negro to own himself that the printing office was sacked by a mob and burned. Then, as more than once afterward for the same cause, Whittier was in danger of his life.

Whittier showed physical courage in facing the ruffians who wished to prevent free speech; but he had revealed the higher moral courage in casting his lot with the little band of abolitionists. Up to this time he had looked forward to holding public office, as well he might, when any another journalist was stepping from the newspaper desk to public life. When he became one of the small band who denounced slavery, he gave up all chance of office. He also had literary ambition, but so strong was the power of the slave owners then, and so intolerent were they, that most editors and publishers were sorely intimidated, and declined to print not only an attack on slavery, but even the other writings of an author who was known as an abolitionist. Thus Whittier, in identifying himself with the anti-slavery movement, thought that he was giving up his literary future also. He made his decision promptly, and he never regretted it. Indeed, in later life he said to a boy of fifteen to whom he was giving counsel: "My lad, if thou wouldst win success, join yourself to some unpopular but noble cause."

THE BICYCLE CANNON. How the Guns May Be Mounted in Future Wars. With the many new devices of offense and defense which have recently made their appearance comes the bicycle-cannon. The gun mounted on a bicycle was in a parade in New York city recently, and was seen by thousands of people, says the National Tribune.

The vehicle was a twin cycle, in appearance much like a tricycle, and known as a duplex. It is especially light and strong. The cannon, a steel rifled affair thirty-four inches in length, eight inches at the butt and four at the muzzle, and weighing about fifty pounds, is swung between the two rear wheels, resting upon the connecting axle and is further supported from above. An ingenious mechanism permits of the piece of ordnance being raised or lowered to any angle.

The cannon contains a two ammunition carrier on another duplex. Four artillerymen equip the battery. They are at once gun crew and motive power. Two men on the seats can propel the machines with their heavy loads at a faster rate than horses have ever shown in similar service. The work of wheeling the gun into position is the work of an instant.

—Twelve miles west of Hereford, at the southern end of the Golden valley, the nave of the old Cistercian abbey of Dore was dug up last summer. There were nine bays to the nave, divided by columns 3 1/2 feet in diameter. Parts of the rude screen and fragments of a shrine in 12th century carving, with traces of color, were found, together with armorial and embossed tiles.

—The biggest moose head ever seen in Maine was brought into Bangor the other day by T. D. M. Cardeza, of Philadelphia. The antlers spread 62 inches, just two inches more than those on a head owned by Hon. C. B. Muzzelle, of Belfast, Me., which was, until Mr. Cardeza secured his trophy, the biggest moose head in Maine. Mr. Cardeza shot the moose at the foot of Chesuncook lake.

—An interesting relic was discovered near San Bernardino, Cal., recently. It is an immense sculptured arrowhead, four feet four inches long and weighing more than 300 pounds. It is of bluish granite and shaped in perfect imitation of the smaller arrowheads frequently found in that region. On the mountain side, near where the stone was found, is a natural formation in the shape of an arrowhead many feet in length and conspicuously visible for many miles.
