UNJUSTLY ASSAILED.

It has been circulated among the voters of Morrow county that A. W. Patterson, the republican nominee for clerk, was instrumental in securing the passage of the law creating sheriff and clerk deputies for Morrow county. This has been done, primarily, to influence the voter against Patterson, though it is likely that many have agitated the matter with an honest belief in the representations made.

I, A. W. Patterson, being first duly sworn, depose and say that I not only had nothing to do directly or indirectly, with securing the passage of the bill to create deputies for the sheriff and clerk of this county, with yearly salaries of \$1,000, but that I knew nothing of the same until the bill had become a law; that the same is being circulated to prejudice my candidacy in the minds of the people of Morrow county; that if elected clerk of this county I pledge that I will request the representative-elect to use his influence towards securing the repeal of the law providing for a deputy clerk in this county.
