WASHINGTON LETTER.

From our Special Correspondent.

It was Mrs. Partington, I believe, who declared to the world that "comparisons are odorous." Now if there is anything odorous about the comparisons I am going to make, it should be a sweet smell in the nostrils of all Oregonians, for the comparisons are very much in favor of their state and the sound sense and political judgment they have heretofore shown.

I do not expect in making this presentation to rival Gladstone, of whom it is said that no other man can make the dry figures of the Budget breathe soulful eloquence, but I do expect to furnish some food for thought to those few persons in Oregon who have an idea that the state does not get its share of the appropriations made by the Federal government.

In proportion to her population Oregon stands first on the list of states in appropriations carried by the River and Harbor bill as passed by the senate. Adding in the amount carried by the Sundry Civil bill the bill carries four million and nineteen thousand dollars for Oregon. In order to illustrate how great this advantage is, I am going to make some comparisons with the three states whose aggregate appropriations exceed those of Oregon.

The bill carries for the great State of New York in continuing contracts and immediate appropriations a little more than it carries for Oregon. But New York has six millions of people and Oregon had according to the last census 313,000. The per capita amount the bill carries for the state of New York is about seventy-four cents. That is to say it directs to be expended in the state of New York a sum equal in amount to seventy-four cents for each man, woman and child that lived in it at the time the last census was taken. On the other hand the bill directs to be expended in the state of Oregon, a sum equal in amount to twelve dollars and forty-five cents for each man, woman and child of her population, or almost seventeen times as much as will be expended in the State of New York, in proportion to population.

The amount to be expended under the bill in the State of Illinois is one dollar and seventy cents per head, or only three-sevenths of that to be expended in the State of Oregon. The amount to be expended in the State of California is three dollars and thirty-one cents per head, a little over one-fourth of that to be expended in the State of Oregon.

The total amount carried by the bill is equivalent to one dollar and twenty cents for each man, woman and child in the United States. If the amount had been distributed equally among the states according to the population Oregon would have received three hundred and seventy-six thousand five hundred and twenty dollars, that is to say three million, seven hundred and sixty-five thousand dollars less than she will receive if the bill becomes a law as it has passed the senate.

If the appropriations for all the other states were in proportion to those it carries for the State of Oregon, the River and Harbor bill would have to carry a total appropriation of seven hundred and fifty-one million dollars, or three hundred millions more than the entire appropriations of the government for every and all purposes.

To a man up a tree—even if he were not credited with the intelligence and discernment usually attributed to the mythical person—it would seem as if this were the appointed time for the patriotic Oregonian to raise his voice in psalms of praise and thanksgiving. And I do not suppose that he would object to her senators and representatives in congress getting a little of that sweet incense, unless indeed he thinks that the love the senators and representatives from other states entertain for Oregon is so much greater than the love they have for their own states and constituents, that they sacrifice themselves on the altar of their love of our Web-footed commonwealth.

I am, of course, well aware, that this bill in its present condition means an expansion of the currency in Oregon, should all the money expended in these improvements remain in the state, of twelve dollars and forty-five cents per capita. On this account I expect to see the Oregonian, regarding as it does anything like inflation of the currency as an unmitigated evil fraught with the most fearful consequences, urge upon President Cleveland the expediency of vetoing this bill. The Oregonian fervently declares that there is too much money in the country and of course it does not count Oregon as being outside the United States.

purpose and practical effect of which was to nullify all the continuing contracts provided for in the bill, by a limitation of the total amount that could be expended in any one year to ten millions of dollars. A motion to lay on the table was defeated by a decisive vote of thirty-one to twenty-three, just before the Senate adjourned for the day. During that night and the next day Senator Mitchell and Senator McBride worked like beavers to strengthen the opposition to the amendment. Senator Mitchell prevailed upon the Senators from the Rocky Mountain states who have little or no interest in the River and Harbor bill to vote on the second motion to table and it was done largely to his efforts that the second motion was carried by as decisive a vote as the first was defeated.

Adjournment of congress is now looked for anywhere between the 5th and 10th of June. It will be impossible for any of the Oregon delegation to leave Washington until adjournment. Senator Mitchell will probably be detained here for several days after adjournment getting his papers in order and settling up matters in the department. He has not had any intention of leaving here until it were safe for Oregon's interests for him to do so. The statement in the Oregonian to the effect that he would be in Oregon about the 17th of this month was evolved out of the inner consciousness of that paper, and is in keeping with the methods it commonly pursues. It would be untruthful to say that Senator Mitchell and Congressman Ellis would not like to be free to go to Oregon and participate in a campaign in which they have a direct personal as well as a party interest but it is impossible for them to do so, and feel that they are justified in sacrificing important state interests for their personal advantage. The last days of a session are usually the most important, and everything has to be carefully watched.
