In the name of the State of Oregon, you are hereby notified to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit on or before the 7th day of September, 1896, and you will take notice that if you fail to answer or otherwise appear in said suit on or before the first day of the next regular term of the above entitled court, to-wit: the 7th day of September, 1896, the plaintiff above named, for want thereof, will apply to the above entitled court for the relief prayed for in the complaint filed in this suit.

For personal decree against the defendants Frank H. Benge and Mary J.
