FAMOUS SONG. The Song That Reaches Our Hearts Is

"My Old Kentucky Home." There is one song in the English language that, perhaps, comes closer to the hearts of Americans, particularly if they are far from home and kinsmen, than any other. That song is "My Old Kentucky Home." The simple, tender story it tells and its irresistible melody are familiar to nearly every one. It has been rung by noted singers in every civilized country on the globe, and has been enlogized by authors and critics of classical taste; yet its author, Stephen Foster, died unhonored and unsung, and unconscious of the masterly work he had wrought. Like nearly all other great artists, however, Foster's recompense came after he was dead, and it is safe to say that "My Old Kentucky Home" and its writer's name will live so long as human sentiment and love of home endure.
