SUMMONS.

George F. McConnell, the defaulting treasurer and keeper of records and seal of the Oregon Knights of Pythias, was indicted in Portland on three charges of forgery of indorsement of bills of exchange. The first is the forgery of a bill of exchange for \$38 on the First National bank of Corvallis, July 14, 1896. The name of E. M. Sargent was forged. Eight witnesses appeared before the grand jury. The second is a bill of exchange on the First National bank of Hillsboro for \$53, with the name of E. M. Sargent forged on the back. The third is for \$54 on the Eugene Loan and Savings bank, issued on the London and San Francisco bank of Portland.

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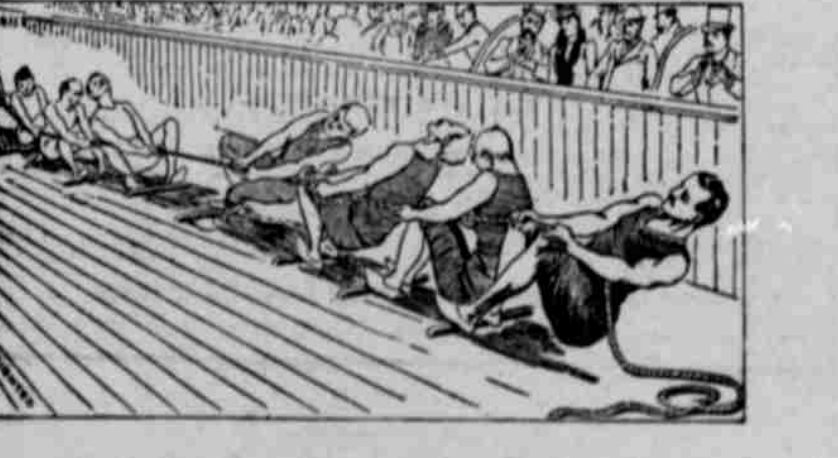
