**MCKINLEY WINS.**

The election is over and while it is not yet possible to give exact majorities enough has been received to show conclusively that McKinley wins, hands down. He will have not less than 264 electoral votes and it is more than likely it will reach all of 277. The majorities given in all the states are decisive. New York gives 259,000 majority, Pennsylvania, 300,000, Massachusetts, 158,000, Illinois, 125,000 and so on. Altgeld is beaten in Illinois for governor, Kentucky is claimed for McKinley by 2,000, Oregon and Morrow county follow suit. It is from all appearances, a grand landslide.

While this has been a royal battle of principle, often dividing father and son, sometimes arraying brother against brother in the contest of ballots, yet we believe that the election of McKinley will result in much good, backed as he no doubt will be by a congress sharing his opinions. It is safe to say that the next house, after the close of the coming short session, will be largely republican, and that the senate will gain enough new blood to give aid to the lower house in all legislation proposed. If, as the Gazette believes, prosperity will return through McKinley's election all will share it alike. With all due respect to our friends who worked so earnestly for Bryan, the Gazette is quite positive that his election would have been followed by terrible distress. The whole machinery of the business world was against him because they could not believe in him. His financial plans were untried, as compared with anything of the past, and all the force of legislation could not have changed the conditions, as the commercial world understood them. Added to this were the advocacy of planks so opposed to the very principles upon which our government stands that men who had always been democrats stood against. The fearful spectre of worse than free trade hovered over the country, and the real issue hinged upon the solemn fact that it is everywhere in this broad land of where there ought to be plenty, bringing ruin and desolation to every locality. The popocrats avoided the real issue and the people have willed that they will have none of them.

Even though William McKinley will not take his seat till next March, yet in anticipation of what his administration will bring to us as a nation, money will come out of its hiding place for investment. Times will pick up considerably. Yet many articles that are now on the free list will be brought into the country in endless quantities, perhaps enough to supply the demand for two or three years. With all this against the producer, yet they will enjoy a better market and consequently better times. Of this result there is not the slightest doubt.

**MCKINLEY HAS IT**

He is Assured of 264 Electoral Votes and Probably 277.

KENTUCKY IS CLAIMED FOR MCKINLEY.

Oregon and California in Line, but Washington Goes "Pop"—Jones and Bryan Both Give up the Fight.

PORTLAND, Nov. 5.—Returns received today authorize the changing of at least two states, Indiana and Kentucky, from the doubtful column to that of states known to have gone for McKinley. Full returns from 73 out of 92 counties in the former state give McKinley a plurality of 20,252, and, while the returns from the other 19 counties may cause this plurality to be somewhat reduced, it cannot fall below 18,000.

This morning 215 plurality was claimed in Kentucky for Bryan, with two counties and several precincts yet to hear from, but later and more complete returns give the state to McKinley by a plurality of between 1000 and 2000, with only a few unimportant precincts yet in doubt.

McKinley, therefore, is now certain of 277 electoral votes, as follows:

Indiana is Safe.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 5.—Seventy-three counties out of 92 in Indiana show a plurality in the state for McKinley of 20,252. The remaining counties may bring it down to 19,000 or 18,000. Nine republican congressmen are elected. It is probable that Landis, republican, in the ninth, is elected over Chedde, fusion free-trader.

**Washington Goes "Pop."**  
SPOKANE, Nov. 6.—Washington has gone for Bryan by 8,000 and the fashionable "pop" Rogers, has carried the state by about 5,000. The legislature in both branches will be controlled by the monarchs.

**Jones Gives It Up.**  
CHICAGO, Nov. 5, 10:20 p. m.—Press dispatch, Lincoln, Neb., 8:25 p. m.—Senator Jones telegraphs to Mr. Bryan that he gives up the fight. Mr. Bryan said that the election of McKinley is conceded and that he will issue a statement tonight.

**Bryan Congratulates Mac.**  
LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 5, 10:25 p. m.—Mr. Bryan wrote the following telegram: "Hon. Wm. McKinley, Canton, Ohio.—Senator Jones has just informed me that he returns indie to your election and I hasten to extend my congratulations. We have submitted the issues to the American people and their will is law. "WILLIAM J. BRYAN."

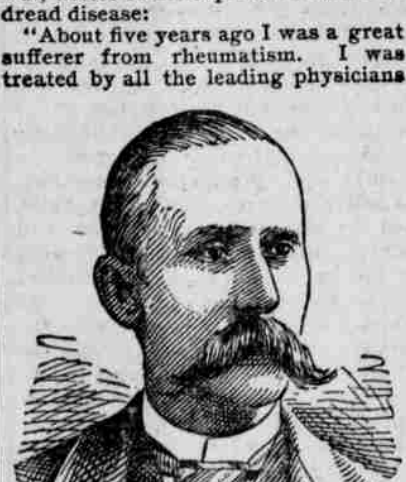

**FROM HARNEY COUNTY.**

John E. Lathrop has an Experience in Stage driving.—The Harney Drive. Lathrop.

John E. Lathrop and T. A. Ryan came in last evening from Monument. Mr. Lathrop having been transformed on the trip from Monument to Heppner from a political speaker to that of a stage driver. His story is a strange one.

He arrived at Monument on his way from Burns on last Wednesday evening, intending to take the stage out on Thursday. The driver, Clyde Thompson, brother of the proprietor, Walt Thompson, became suddenly insane and was detained at Monument, so that Mr. Lathrop had no other choice than to take charge of the ribbons and pilot the conveyance over. Three lines accompanied him, and with his saddle horse aided much in pulling the team up steep pitches, one of the animals being very balky.

Mr. Lathrop says that the driver, Thompson, setled queerly before leaving Heppner, as he failed to eat his breakfast after ordering it and also asked some queer questions. At R. Allen's he acted very strange and talked like a crazed man. He was late all the way through and did not reach Monument till 10 o'clock, p. m. After attending to his horses he did not come to bed or bring the mail in. About 3 o'clock, a. m., he came into S. S. Wilson's place where he stayed at that end and built a fire. On being asked what was the matter he said that he was all right, and then in a rambling manner claimed that he did not rob the U. S. mail, and was accused of it but that others were guilty. He was finally persuaded to go to bed. He will be brought in today probably and examined as to his sanity. He is a young man about 25 years of age and has always been steady and industrious. The cause of his trouble is not known.

The estimated majority in Grant for Bryan is 150 to 200.
