The first article made of this metal was in compliment to Louis Napoleon—who had helped Deville—a baby rattle for the Infant prince imperial.

In 1855, when the first aluminum company was formed, the cost of a pound of the metal was about \$200. In 1895 Charles M. Hall, of Oberlin, O., patented an electrolytic process. He with a few of his Triends then started a small plant on the bank of the Allegheny river, 18 miles above Pittsburgh. The first year the company produced 75 pounds of aluminum a day, which they sold at \$4.50 a pound. In 1895 a company built a large plant at Niagara falls, and this year they are building additional works. When these are completed they will have an output of 11,000 pounds daily. This will put the United States in front as the largest aluminum-producing country in the world.

Aluminum's weight is about one-third that of iron, and only steel of the high est quality and the best aluminum bronze will give a greater strength for a given weight than aluminum. It stands high in the list of malleable metals, and can be drawn into wire 1-250th of an inch in thickness. It is an excellent conductor of electricity, and would at 20 cents a pound take the place of copper for all electrical purposes.
