STATISTICS FOR IDLY CURIOUS. Computations on Smoke Puffs, Kisses, Air Pressure and Politicians. A German lover of figures has made the following curious calculations, says the Berliner Abend Post: A man smoking a pipe of medium size blows out of his mouth for every time he fills the pipe 700 smoke clouds. If he smokes four pipes a day for twenty years he blows out 20,440,000 smoke clouds. If two lovers spend four hours together and the lover takes or receives 200 kisses—low calculation—and each kiss lasts ten seconds, in five years' time the lover would have 655,000 kisses, and their lips would have been united for the space of forty-six days and six hours. If the entire population is considered to be 1,400,000,000 the brains of this number of human beings would weigh 1,922,715 tons, or as much as ninety-six ironclads of the ordinary size. The air pressure on a person of ordinary size is thirteen and a half tons. A man of fifty years of age has in ordinary cases undressed himself 18,320 times, and, of course, dressed himself just as many times. When a person on the street raises his hat, makes a bow, the work of a second, he is carried by the movement of the earth 500 meters round with the planet, three miles round the sun, and nearly a mile forward with the sun.

The Salt of the Sea. According to a computation of the Berg und Huettenmaennische Zeitung the amount of salt in the sea waters of the globe, if extracted, would be greater in mass than the land, so far as it appears above the surface. The seas, it says, contain 75 per cent of the earth's surface, estimated at 3,500,000 (three million) square miles. The percentage of chloronium in the sea is the same at all depths. Assuming that the average depth of the sea is a half (four) mile there are then 3,500,000 cubic miles of sea water. A cubic mile of sea water contains, on the average, about 25 kilograms of salt. The 3,500,000-cubic miles of sea water would, therefore, contain 87,500,000 cubic miles of distilled pure salt. There is, therefore, little danger of a salt famine—the rather logical deduction of the writer.

A FATAL INITIATION. Further Particulars Concerning the Death of Democratic Chairman Curry at Des Moines.

From the E. O. A dispatch appeared in the East Oregonian a few days ago regarding a death caused by injuries received while being initiated into the Elk's lodge at Des Moines. The particulars are here given in another Des Moines dispatch: "E. W. Curry, chairman of the democratic central committee, died this morning in his room in the hotel Savary. The death was the direct result of injuries received while being initiated into Des Moines lodge of Elks, about two months ago. As part of the ceremony he was blindfolded and placed on a chair with an iron seat. Then a lighted lamp was placed under the seat, with the expectation that when it got too hot he would jump. But he sat still until he was badly burnt. His trousers were burned away and the flesh was fearfully scorched. He was put into new clothes and did not realize at the time that the injuries were serious. In a few days blood poisoning set in and he grew steadily worse. It was his desire that the real cause of his injuries should not be made public and another cause assigned for the illness, the truth only becoming public today. An evening paper published a highly sensational story that the injuries were caused by placing him in an electric chair, but this is denied by the Elks. "Mr. Curry lived at Leon and was a leading attorney. The body will be taken there tomorrow by a large escort of Elks and Masons and the funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon."
