Perhaps the most interesting sight to a traveler at any of the English public schools is the names of "old boys" carved on wallcoats and pillars. At Etou you are shown "H. Wesley," which is said to be the way Arthur Wellesley, Duke of Wellington, wrote his name, and which is certainly the way he always pronounced it. Pitt carved his name in modest little italics. Charles James Fox sprawled his in bold capitals. Shelley's name, near by, is a study. Each letter is quite plainly, even boldly, formed, and yet they huddle together so nervously that they seem to shrink from being seen. As you look at them you call to mind the rare courage and independence that made Shelley refuse to be flaged at Etou, and then his pitiful plight when the fog-masters got up "Shelley haits" and hunted him through the streets of the town. You can almost see before you his pale cheeks and inlustrous eyes. There are many other interesting things about these carvings, which are described by John Corbin in the current number of Harper's Round Table, but none so significant as this little record of how thoroughly the boy Shelley was father of the man.
