



SCIENTIFIC REASON GIVEN. Why the Eyes of a Painted Portrait Follow the Observer.

Wollaston's curious discovery was that by adding to each pair of eyes a nose directed to the right or the left. the eyes lose their front direction, and look to the right or left, according to the direction of the nose. By means of a flap representing the lower features in a different position, as Dr. Wollaston remarks, "a lost look of devout abstrac-This is the best medicine in the world tion in an uplifted countenance of inliquely toward the opposite side."
