In the Austrian army many experiments were made last winter near Krakin in the substitution of snow runners for the ordinary cannon wheels. A Butter Creek Man Named Clark Gets Into Serious Trouble.

The sheriff's office gathered in a man Saturday evening who may at least be credited with adopting novel means to accomplish the ruin of a young girl. His name is R. S. Clark. He is a bachelor and lives out on Butter creek Friday night, he took a young girl named Cummings from her home in that neighborhood and started to attend a dance. Instead of going to the dance, he drove on to Pendleton with the girl, arriving here at 5 a. m. Saturday, and first to the Golden Rule, where he registered as Ben Clark. During the day he requested William P. Allen, the clerk, to scratch the name from the register, giving as a reason that he had been in trouble and had not yet fixed up the matter, but would in a few days have it arranged all right. Mr. Allen complied, and Clark then went to the Willike restaurant and procured a room, where he took the girl and left her.

Clark proceeded to the court house secured blank forms of marriage affidavit and license, saying he wanted them for a friend who was going to marry a young lady who was under legal age, and that, therefore, he must obtain the girl's parents' consent.

Clark himself filled out the blanks and took them to the young girl and made her believe that that made the marriage legal without the necessity of any further formalities.

Ed C. Allen, proprietor of the Golden Rule hotel, had his suspicions aroused by the man's peculiar actions and informed the sheriff's office of his belief that something was wrong. A deputy was detailed to look up the matter and found the couple in the room at the Willike restaurant.

When informed of the true facts, the young girl for the first time realized that she had been lured to ruin by Clark, and she swore to a complaint against him. Clark was arrested and taken to jail. He stated that he really intended to marry the girl, but made no denial of the allegations against him.

Mrs. Cummings says she is 16 years old, which, if true, may save Clark from conviction under the statute defining rape, the statute placing the age of consent at 16 years.

The girl is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. Cummings, who live in the Big Potts county near the line between Umatilla and Morrow counties. Several persons living in Pendleton know the young lady and say that she is at least 17 years old, though some doubt this.

The charge against Clark, in case it is shown in court that she is 16, will be seduction. He will be examined tomorrow in Justice Parker's court.
