GETTING PERSONAL.

A recent issue of the Walla Walla Statesman speaks out in such a manner that its remarks well fit other towns besides Walla Walla. It says:

"Much against the wishes of the proprietor of the statesman, he has been obliged, against his inclinations to discontinue the services of Mr. Walter Lingensfelder, who has been city editor of the Statesman for over a year, and in that capacity has proved his competency and fidelity in every way. Not the least fault have we had to find with him. He has proved his fidelity to this office and the democratic party in every way he could be of service voluntarily, for all the editorial business has been heretofore left in his charge. But the hard times, in connection with the fact that the business men of this city evidently do not appreciate, by their advertising patronage, the advantage of a good city editor, and others who really go out of their way to send to Portland, Seattle, Spokane and other places for their printing, which they could get as cheaply done at home, obliges us to dispense with the services of a good and true man who is, with his family, identified with the city. While it is purely, in some respects, a matter of business with the proprietor of the Statesman, to forego the services of a good man, that same business proposition obliges him to dispense with him because the business element will not stand in to assist, in anyway, a newspaper that is devoted to their interests. It is with sorrow, we pen these lines but the advertising columns of both the daily papers of the city will tell the tale. In other towns, the business men are taxed to support their papers but here never has anything of the kind ever been proposed. In Walla Walla people come here, start in business and expect every favor from the papers; but how few ever by their patronage in advertising or printing assist, in a reasonable degree, the great efforts of their daily newspapers to make both ends meet and assist in paying their hands off every Saturday, although every cent is distributed amongst them. Compare the advertising columns of any one horse town with Walla Walla and you will find four to one advertisers to this great city."
