Postmaster at Hood River Named at Congressman Ellis' Instance.

W. M. Yates has been appointed postnaster at Hood River, and, so far as is known, his is the first appointment made in Oregon, on the recommendation of a member of the congressional delegation. It is claimed as first blood for Ellis, and as a Mitchell victory. The selection is evidently not satisfactory to all the people of Hood River, and Mr. H. T. Davidson, of that town, who is now in Portland, says the appointment of Yates will make lots of populists in that

locality. The other applicant for the place was James H. Dukes, who served during the civil war as captain, and is a member of the G. A. R. Captain Dukes was recommended by E. L. Smith, presidential elector, and all of the delegation to the National republican convention, who recognized the merit of an old soldier. while nearly every patron of the Hood River postoffice joined in signing a petition for his appointment. In face of all this, Congressman Ellis turned bim down to appoint another man at the dictation of ex-Senator Mitchell.
