In Custody of The Sheriff. Last November R. C. Boggs was arrested on a warrant sworn out in Justice Hall's court for the larceny of a hat and pen knife from the store of D. P. King & Co. He waived examination and was placed under \$250 bonds to await the action of the grand jury, giving an undertaking with A. C. Ballance and G. J. Tucker sureties. Last week the sureties got word that Mr. Boggs was preparing to skip out of the country, so they at once proceeded to Cottonwood and returned with Mr. Boggs and turned him over to Deputy Sheriff Gus Sloan. Being unable to give a new bond, he was taken to Canyon City Monday, and now languisheth in jail.—L. C. Eagle.
