SAVED FROM DROWNING. The Heroism of a Miller in Rescuing a Little Girl. The brave work of a miller in saving a little girl from drowning is described by the Indianapolis Journal. The mill-owner and his wife, it appears, had gone to the city, leaving an eight-year-old girl at home. With other children she went down to the mill to play, and by some accident fell into the sluice which feeds the turbine wheel. The head miller heard a scream, and not knowing what had happened, applied a brake and stopped the machinery. Then he ran out, found the little girl just disappearing under the water, and in he went after her. Then he found himself in a hard place. The water was eight feet deep, and he was four feet below the top of the sluice, the sides of which were as smooth as a polished floor. The girl was unconscious. How was he to get her out? It took one hand to hold her head above water, and the other to keep himself from sinking. He must try to throw her out, and this, by a great effort, he did. But the rebound drove him under water and against the wheel, where he was in great danger of being caught and held. He came up again, however, and now a new difficulty confronted him. How was he to get out himself? He sank to the bottom, gave an upward spring, and as he came up half-blinded, succeeded in catching the top of the sluice. Then, by the greatest exertions, he drew himself out. The girl was still unconscious, but by vigorous measures was at last revived.

FROM BRITISH COLUMBIA. The Country of Rich Mines and Booming Towns—A Great Mineral Belt. Case Matlock, one of our old residents, but late of Sandon, B. C., arrived here on Wednesday morning, accompanied by a fellow townsman, Edward Bartlett. Mr. Matlock is in the hotel business in Sandon while Mr. Bartlett is packing into the mines and conducting a general livery business in the same town. The stories of prosperity and substantial boom related by our friends from the country above are enough to excite a tenderfoot to imminent danger of immediate dissolution, while the older and more experienced resident cannot help but listen with wonder. Messrs. Matlock and Bartlett showed a representative of the Gazette some silver ore which assayed over fifty per cent. pure silver, and he was reminded that there was plenty of it up in the Sloane country. In the vicinity of Sandon there are over fifty well-developed and paying mines. Mr. Bartlett comes down to buy a lot of mules for packing operations, and no doubt he will secure them in this locality. Mr. Matlock, as every resident of the locality knows, has large ranch and sheep interests in this section and he may remain here for some time. There is no denying the fact that the Sloane section is but in its infancy in the process of development. Sandon, but a few months old, has not less than 1500 inhabitants.
