THERE ARE TWO SECTS. Mohammedans Are Divided According to

Their Creedal Forms. Mohammedans divide themselves into two principal sects-Shiah and Sunni, the Persians representing the bulk of the former, the Turks of the latter. The chief points on which they differ are the condition of the soul after death and the succession of caliphs. The Sunni believe that there is one immortal God, whose works are without beginning or end, and that He will be visible to the souls of the blessed; while the Shiahs deny the immortality of the soul and maintain that the coexistent principles of Zoroaster will Sunpis claim that the lawful successor of Mohammed was Abu Bekrand after him Omar Csman and Ali (nephew and son-in-law of Mohammed); the Shiahs. however, reject the first three and hold

Shinhs pray but three times a day, and enjoin pilgrimages to Nejef, Kerbela, Kazimain, Meshed (Persia), Samara and Kum, as well as to Meeca and Medina, Sunnis make pilgrimages only to the two latter cities and pray five times a day. From this it can be readily understood that the circumstance of the Turks being in possession of the shrines of Nejef (Meshed Ali), Kazimain and Kerbela is most displeasing to devout Shiahs.-Blackwood's

HOW DUELS ARE STARTED. "Moral Box on the Ear" Given in a Let

ter Is an Insult. Arthur Thiele, a young student at the high school of technology in Charlottenburg, near Berlin, has been sent to a fortress for nine months because he provoked and fought with Dr. Brockelmann, says the New York Sun.

Brockelmann was Thiele's second in a sword duel, and in his comments on the meeting criticised severely one of Thiele's strokes. Thiele regarded the criticism as an insult. He challenged the doctor, but a court of honor decided the doctor was under no obligation to accept the challenge. This decision angered Thiele. He was determined to have a duel at any price. So he sat down and wrote what, to his German mind, was the most insulting letter he could think out. This letter reached its climax in the sentence: "You may regard yourself as moral-

ly boxed on the ear by the under signed." To Brockelmann's German mind, too this seemed an insult that only blood could wipe out. Thus it came that early one morning Thiele and Brockelmann found themselves ten paces apart in the Grunewald and shot at each other until Thiele fell with a dangerous wound in the abdomen. Thiele lingered for days between life and death, but after once taking a turn for the better, recovered rapidly. With
