In Guerrero the tarantula is sometimes found there as big as a man's two fists. Scorpions are of all sizes, but the one which does the most harm by its bite is a smallish gray creature. The larger ones bite so hard that the blood flows freely, and the infected poison flows off. There is a little snake called the corallilo, which is particularly fond of getting indoors and nesting in one's boots. Its bite is fatal. Boots should refrain from making any movement; he should allow the horrible insect to crawl just where it will. If it is not disturbed, in all likelihood it will do no harm; if it is attacked it is quite sure to
