THE LONGFELLOW STATUE. 'itting Memorial of the Poet at Portland, His Birthplace.

One of the best instances of what the statue of any great man should be-at any rate, in the respect of its situation, its perspective with regard to other memorials and the local estimation in which it is held-is the statue of Longfellow at Portland, says the Atlantic. It is a dignified seated figure of the poet in bronze, occupying a conspicuous site in the best part of the town, in the middle of a square which is known as Longfellow square. The statue was raised a few years ago by a fund solicited through a wide field, but chiefly obtained in Portland. The sculptor was chosen through that curious local spirit which has affected unfavorably many of our architectural and other monuments. He was avowedly selected because he was a "Maine man," though he had never seen the poet. However, the result in this case seems to have been happy. The statue has much beauty and the likeness is said to be excellent. This statue stands in the poet's native town, as is entirely proper.
