MINING NEWS.

The completion of the organization of The Blue Mountain Mining & Milling Co. was effected on last Saturday at this place as follows: Geo. Conser, Pres.; D. A. Curry, Vice Pres.; Ed. R. Bishop, Sec. and Treas.; Thos. L. La Forge, Supt. and Gen. Man. The list of directors are T. A. Rhea and the above-named gentlemen. This company has four promising claims in the Willow creek district, and at the present has a day and night shift working on a tunnel on the Jumbo. The ore still continues free milling and is getting richer as the tunnel progresses. The immense amount of ore of these properties, though they may be of low grade, is what counts. It is worth anything at all the company has millions in sight. The tunnel is in the ledge 30 feet and progressing at the rate of a foot a day. While quartz assays still continue to be good, the company propose to make a mill test of three tons in the very near future and will send it over to Tacoma. The object in making this test is to ascertain the value of the ore and also to learn the best process by which it can be reduced. If the ore continues good a mill will be erected in the near future.

The ledge of the Jumbo claim is 300 feet wide and well defined. It can be seen on the mountain for 3,000 feet down. These are not the only good claims in the district. There are many locations and most of them are promising. This district has plenty of mineral, and it now remains to be seen whether it will pay to work.
 Thos. L. La Forge, Supt. and Gen. Man. of the Blue Mountain company, was in town Saturday and is feeling quite cheerful over the prospect. He is an experienced man and his opinion counts for a great deal. Mr. La Forge is easy to approach and he talked freely to a Gazette reporter when seen by the scribe last Saturday evening. He is courteous and obliging and no doubt visitors will enjoy a trip up to his headquarters at the mines.
 The Constock Mining and Milling Co. are pushing the work of organization as fast as possible and are disposing of considerable treasury stock. They are starting it at 2½ cents per share and the proceeds will be used to develop the claims. It is the opinion of Mr. La Forge that this company has plenty of good rock. Every business man of Heppner should buy a few shares of stock, at least.
 Now that the evidence of gold quartz in the Willow creek belt is in existence beyond any question of doubt, enterprising prospectors will keep on the lookout for paying placer. Already ground has been discovered that will pay fair returns per man.

A GOOD SHOWING.
 What Kind of a Story the Semi-Annual Statement Tells.

In our next issue will appear the semi-annual county statement and it will worth the perusal of our people. They will see that Morrow county, under the management of Judge Bartholomew, is prospering; that it is gradually getting out of debt.

For the year 1895-6 this county went behind \$5,000. For the year 1896-7 the county held its own and wiped out \$5,000 of indebtedness. This is indeed a creditable showing and is pleasing to our taxpayers.

One significant feature is that our merchants now take all county scrip at par for goods at cash prices. Over in Umatilla county scrip is worth its face in cash, and the county is not in as good financial condition as Morrow. It is thought that in the very near future our scrip will go up to face value for cash and remain there. It is well worth it now.

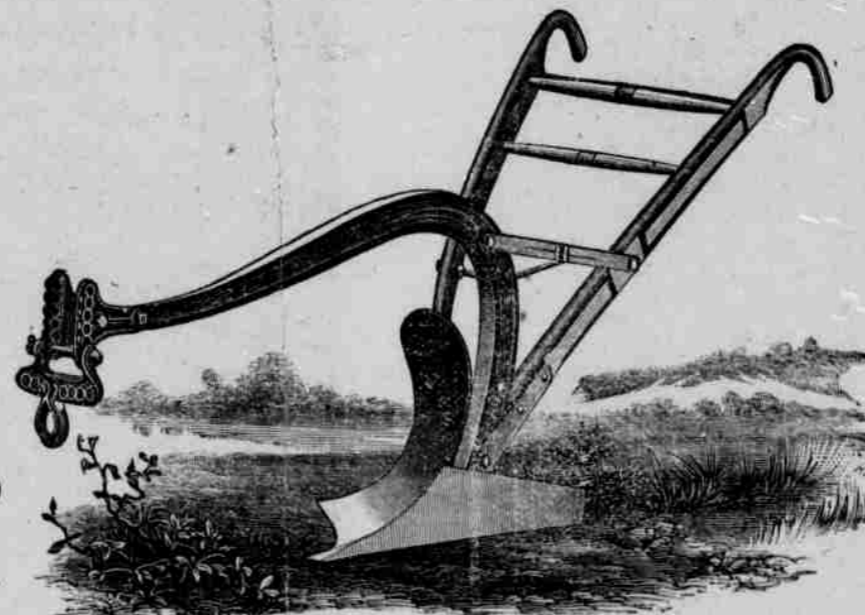
