HEPPNER BOOMING.
Charles Cunningham Gives a Glowing Account of That City.

Charles Cunningham has returned from Heppner where he went with a carload of his thoroughbred bucks. He sold a number while there and left the remainder with Ed. Bishop to sell.
Mr. Cunningham comes home with the most encouraging tidings of business conditions in that city. His dealings there took him to the First National bank of which institution Mr. Cunningham has many good things to say. Perhaps the best of all is that, during the hard times of the last few years, which at intervals bordered upon a panic, there was not a single man or business firm doing business with the bank either closed out or sold out. This is particularly remarkable, thinks Mr. Cunningham, when it is remembered that the sheep industry is carried on so extensively in that part of the state.
The people of Heppner are in the highest of spirits, says the Tribune's informant, which is to be accounted for in the fact that the town is enjoying almost unprecedented prosperity. O. E. Redfield, the attorney, formerly of this city, he says, is doing a land office business.

Oliver Pearson, of Eight Mile, was in town with a load of Irish potatoes yesterday. He left a sample of his product at the Gazette office. The "sample" consisted of 30 potatoes, every one of which was large enough to make campaign speeches. This colossal aggregation of "spuds," collectively, tipped the scales at 50 pounds and they were not culled from a large lot either. They were of about equal size and were fat as thoroughbred Poland China pigs, with blue eyes, smooth faces and rosy cheeks. FROM ALASKA.
A Morrow Countyman Who was Successful in Crossing the Pass, Writes a Few Interesting Dots.
Mr. Sam Easley, who left Hardman some time ago, bound for the Klondike region, writes his wife, under date of September 27, a very interesting letter concerning his experiences, which Mrs. Easley kindly furnishes the Gazette for publication. Mr. Easley says:
"After a long delay I write to let you know how I am getting along and what I have been doing. I am now in camp at Lake Bennett. Have part of our supplies here, and the remainder within 10 miles of here. Will get them all here inside of six days if our horses hold out. I am getting ready to saw lumber for a boat. Think we will get ready to start down in about eight days. It is freezing very little at night and it is raining and snowing, but I hardly think it will freeze up so as to prevent us from proceeding into the Klondike. I am exceedingly strong and hardy, especially after going through what I have during the past month. If anyone had told me before I started what hardships I had to undergo, I would have said at once it is impossible. I thought I had gone through and had seen sights and hardships, but I never before in all my life saw such times as I have seen the last five weeks, and may God grant that I never may be called to experience such a time again, but thank the good Lord he has stretched forth his strong arm and enabled me to accomplish a thing almost incredible. I will not attempt to explain, for I could not, even if I had time. Two of my party gave it up and went back, leaving everything with us—three in number. That left us with a big outfit. We left about a ton of stuff about half way over the pass. Have taken in a partner who had horses and we are now getting along better. We lost our first horses long ago, but bought five more for \$300. Have two of them left. I bought four head day before yesterday for \$100. With what the man had we took in we have now 13 head on the trail. The boys with the team are due this evening, but I don't expect all of the horses will get in. The trail is lined with dead horses. I think our horses will hold out to get us through, and then we will not have it so hard.

Flour is \$25 per sack; bacon 50 cents per pound, and everything else in proportion, except oats which is worth from \$75 to \$100 per sack. I paid \$1 for 16 horsehoe nails, and a number of men paid 25 cents a piece. I haven't time to write much, as the man who takes the letter is ready to start back. I do hope you are all getting along well, and I assure you that I do not regret coming and am hopeful, stout and hardy. I suppose you were uneasy for fear I was in the great disaster on the Dyea trail, but I was not on that trail. I don't know how many were killed, but there were quite a number. It was a terrible affair. I will try and give full details of my trip when I get into winter quarters. Good bye for the present.

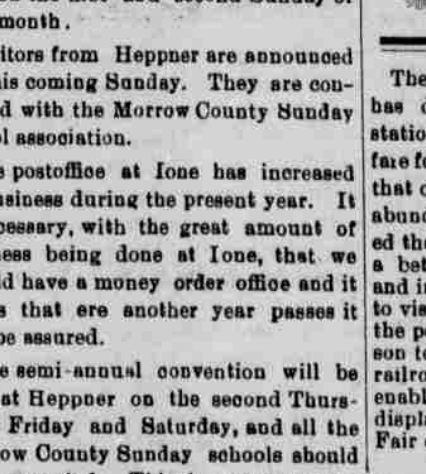
