THE STATE SENATE. Fifteen of the thirty Members to be Chosen Next June. As the time draws near there is an apparent increase of interest as to whether Mr. Corbett will be seated as senator from Oregon when congress convenes next month.

First-Marion county, two senators. Second-Linn county, two senators. Third-Lane county, two senators. Fourth-Douglas county, one senator. Fifth-Coos, Curry and Josephine, one senator.

At each biennial election, 15 senators are chosen and those whose terms will expire in 1898 are: Brownell, of the 11th; Calbreath, of the 10; Carter, of the 8th; Dawson and Johnson, of the 2d; Geener, of the 13; Gowan, of the 23; Hobson and Patterson, of the 1st; Holt, of the 6th; King, of the 22d; McClung, of the 13d; Price, of the 19th; Simon, of the 14th, and Smith, of the 15th senatorial districts.

Of the holdovers, Daly and Dufur are classed as democrats, but have leanings toward Mitchell. Wade is a populist and the remaining 12 are republicans.
