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MORROW COUNTY SCHOOL LANDS.

State Land Board Passes an Order Regarding Delinquent Purchasers. From Oregonian of the 25th.

The board of state land commissioners—Governor Lord, Secretary of State Kinoid and State Treasurer Metcalf—at a meeting in Salem Tuesday, on the recommendation of A. G. Bartholomew, representative of the board in Morrow county, passed an important order regarding delinquent school land purchasers in Morrow county.

It seems there are many citizens in Morrow county, original purchasers of state school lands, who are not only largely in arrears to the state in payment of principal and interest, but, by reason of the forbearance of the board, have absorbed the utmost limit prescribed by statute, for deferring these payments (and one, two or three years besides), and are now leasing their lands for a nominal rental per year, per quarter-section, half-section or section, to neighboring cattlemen, as ranges and pastures.

Judge Bartholomew made a formal showing of these facts to the board and suggested that the state assume its prerogative of canceling these delinquent certificates of purchase, freeing the lands (which approximately aggregate 10,000 acres) from the profligate occupancy of the lessees of the delinquent owners, and put them in such condition as to be again salable to bona fide buyers, or accessible to lease, for periods not greater than one year, to the same or other lessees, with the revenue therefrom accruing directly to the state, rather than to people already largely in arrears to the state school fund.

The board discussed the suggestion fully, and made an order declaring the cancellation and forfeiture of all such lands, the certificate-holders of which had transcended the statutory requirements of final settlement within six years. As fast as the lands are freed from their present resourceless attitude, they will be placed upon the market for sale or lease upon safer and more profitable terms.

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
