KILLED ON THE PILE-DRIVER.

H. A. Baker Fell Five Feet and Was Killed
Instantly.

From The Dalles Chronicle.

At 1 o'clock yesterday a remarkable
and fatal accident occurred to one of the
men who worked on the O. R. & N. pile-
driver in Mill creek basin.

The man, whose name was H. A.
Baker, was standing on one of the cribs
on which the pile-driver is placed, when
the foreman told him to step aside, as
they were going to move the machine
ahead. In getting out of the way he
stepped over the edge of the crib and
fell a distance of about five feet, strik-
ing on his head and receiving injuries
from which he died almost instantly.
Dr. Logan was called, but when he ar-
rived the man was beyond all aid.

His body was taken to Crandall &
Burgett's undertaking parlors, where an
inquest will be held. The strangest part
of the matter was that he fell in the soft
mud, and there seemed to be nothing on
which he could have struck that would
have injured him. In all probability he
broke his neck when he struck the ground
head foremost.

The deceased is a widower about 65
years old, and so far as could be found
out, has a daughter in Portland, who
was immediately telegraphed for. He
was a civil engineer, and was engaged in
that position when the accident oc-
curred.

GRANT COUNTY NEWS.

From The Eagle.

W. M. Radio, of this city, one of the
largest dealers in cattle in Grant county,
sold to Nick Hall, of Monument, Satur-
day last, twenty head of cows and calves,
receiving for each cow and calf \$24.00.

A fine band of deer is reported having
been seen on the side of the mountain
within a few miles of town the latter
part of last week. They have been
driven down by the heavy snows in the
mountains.

Neil Jackson, a miner who has been
working in the old Princess mine above
Susanville, has struck a ledge of very
rich ore, which he estimates will average
\$60 per ton. Quite a lot of ore has been
taken out, and will be hauled to the
Sloan stamp mill and crushed, from
which ore great returns are expected.

James Lindsey, a prominent horse-
buyer of Pendleton, who has been in this
valley for the past week buying horses
succeeded in purchasing about thirty
head of fine large animals from farmers
in Fox Valley, paying \$25 per head for
same. These horses were unbroken and
the price paid was considerably more
than could have been obtained for them
one year ago.

Jack Donald, the party who so bra-
vally beat up a Chinese shepherd
near Monument several days ago, men-
tioned of which was made in the Eagle
last week, had his preliminary exami-
nation before Justice Bowman at Monu-
ment last Friday and was held to appear
at the next term of court in the sum of
\$300, and not being able to give a bond
he was taken to Canyon City and turned
over to Sheriff Livingston. The Chinaman
is still very low and not expected to
live, and in case he dies, Donald will
have a more serious charge to answer
for.

two old Alaska miners. He brought
home with him some Klondike gold, and
expects to return in the spring. He
came out on snow shoes over the Dalton
trail, was 28 days making the trip from
Dawson to Dyea, and 55 days from Daw-
son to Cascade Locks. Dawson, Mr.
Ash says, is a lively place of 6,000 to
8,000 inhabitants, with a bank, opera
house and numerous stores and saloons.
Cost of living there is very high, a small
cup of beans being worth one dollar,
and all other articles of food command
proportionately high prices.
