

WHEAT IS on the upward grade again. It is likely to reach a high figure, judging from the tone of speculators in the east and the foreign market.

WORD comes back from Cuba that it is not certain that Gen. Ruiz has been executed. It is denied that he made the visit for political purposes.

INDIAN Ter. braves talk about war. Better exterminate the whole outfit. They have been costly wards and are as unappreciative as they are expensive.

SENATOR HANNA has gone to Ohio, to remain until the legislature elects his successor. Just before leaving Washington, he said: "The stories sent from Ohio that a number of the republican members of the general assembly will desert me if I am not successful on the first ballot seems to me absurd. Every republican county but four has instructed its legislators for me; the party is pledged to me through the action of the republican state convention at Toledo, and I am unable to see what can stand in the way of my election."

THE fact that the senate did not act upon Attorney General McKenna's nomination to the bench of the supreme court before the recess hasn't the significance some persons are trying to give it; in fact, it has no significance. The nomination did not go to the senate until two days before the recess and there was no time for the judiciary committee, which never acts hurriedly upon nominations of the supreme court, to consider it. The nomination will be confirmed, and the smallness of the vote against confirmation will be another proof of how poorly informed some newspapers are about sentiments entertained by senators.

PRESIDENT MCKINLEY will, according to trustworthy though unofficial information, shortly meet the objections that exist, in and out of congress, against present conditions in the civil service, by issuing an executive order making material modifications in the blanket extensions of the civil service rules made by Mr. Cleveland during his last year in office. While the opposition on the part of republicans in congress doubtless was a factor in this matter, it is well known that the president has had it in mind ever since his election. It will be remembered that he said in his annual message: "There are places now in the classified service which ought to be exempt and others not classified, may be properly included. I shall not hesitate to exempt cases which I think have been improperly included in the classified service." Just when this order will be issued or the full extent of the modification has not been fully determined, but it will not be surprising should the order be issued before the reassembling of congress, on Jan. 5.

PHASE COMMENT.

The United States senate committee, having in charge the case of ex-senator Corbett, who makes persistent application to "break into the senate" as a representative of the people of Oregon, has postponed consideration of the merits of the case until after the holidays. The expense and the expense of the ex-senator in connection with this matter are quite considerable and it is not known which one cause him the most worry.—East Oregonian.

And so Barkley is to be a candidate for congress in the first district. Nothing could be more fitting. Barkley has more ability than Vanderberg and consequently would be better able to defend his irresponsible acts in the last legislature. By all means let the names of both Barkley and U'Hen appear on the state ticket. They would fittingly represent their following and the people would have a chance to sit in judgment upon their past records.—Oregon City Enterprise.

A meeting of the legislative hold-up class was held at McMinnville last Saturday. It was the meeting of the state central committee of the populist, democratic and union bi-metallic parties—the same parties that prevented the organization of the last legislature—the object being to form a coalition for the purpose of capturing the offices at the next state election. Each of these organizations pretended to represent, separately, a great principle, else why would these separate and distinct party

organizations be maintained? The Enterprise has all along contended that all there was to populism was for the leaders to hold office, and the contention has never been more clearly proven than in this instance where the three parties have laid aside their respective principles and banded themselves together with one object in view, namely, to develop strength in the elections. Their principles count for nothing; it is votes they want. These three elements have no principles to carry out after they are elected, as was shown by them in the last legislature. They promised the people all things before election, just as they are now doing, but after election did they attempt to have enacted any of the remedial legislation advocated in the campaign? Not only did they refuse to make good their promises but they also refused to allow any other party to enact legislation for the benefit of the taxpayers. They refused absolutely to even take the oath of office during the forty days session, and why? Because they represented no principle save that of delivering themselves after the purchase price had been paid. Their object first, last and all the time is to howl oasantry and hold office. Principles out no figure.—Oregon City Enterprise.
