PRESS COMMENT.

By the populist county central committee sustaining Mr. U'Hen in his compact with Simon to hold up the legislature that party goes on record as being responsible for the legislative disgrace. The fact must not be overlooked that it took 40 members of the house to constitute a quorum to do business. According to U'Hen's own statement last Saturday the republicans had 38 of this number, leaving them two short of enough to organize. Out of this number 29 were in their seats every day ready to proceed with the state's business for which they had been elected. With the 29 republicans that were present every day the populists had enough to have completed the organization at any time but they refused to do so. Not even one of their number would consent to go in and as it is in the organization. They were a solid compact against all efforts to enact remedial legislation for which they had pledged themselves every day during the state campaign of 1896. There was not a single day during the attempted session that the populist members could not have supplied the required two-thirds to make up a quorum for the transaction of business. But did they do it? No. And the reason they did not is well explained in Mrs. Lewelling's sworn affidavit which appears in another column of this paper.—Oregon City Enterprise.

All the "ites" and "ists" of the state, personally or representatively, from \$80 U'Hen and \$— Young to granting Bob Miller and anguring Sydney Dell, are now communiting in Portland with a view to the salvation of the country, most of them not overlooking, however, any incidental "boodle" that may lie in the path of glory. When one looks the crowd over and "sized" it "up," he can cherish a kindly and fraternal feeling for a republicanism "boss."—Portland Welcome, Dem.

Somebody, in looking about for suitable material for governor, mentions the name of Judge Stephen A. Lowell for the position. Judge Lowell is well qualified for the office and would discharge the duties with honor to the state and to himself, if elected. However, Judge Lowell has a fairly good position as judge of the 8th judicial district. He was elected a year ago last June, and therefore has almost four and a half years yet to serve the people, unless he should desire to resign in the meantime, which is not likely. He has proven himself a good judicial officer and the people of Umattila and Morrow counties are in no wise anxious to part with him, not even temporarily, so we are inclined to think the matter will not be regarded seriously by Judge Lowell and his friends.—Milton Eagle.
