

In our last issue our editorial writer made comment on a clipping from the Herald, a populist paper published at Pendleton, in reference to Senator Wolcott, of Colorado, in which the Herald was represented as being about right. This was stated on the presumption that the reports concerning Wolcott's general dissatisfaction with the president and on the supposition that this and remarks attributed to him were true. Senator Wolcott's noble stand with the president, as given out by the press early this week, entirely removes all doubt as to his loyalty to both the president and to the republican party, for after a speech of over an hour on the subject of international bimetalism and his experience in Europe while a member of the bimetallic commission, he stated clearly that he was with the president and the republican party, and so clearly and thoroughly did he discuss his subject that he was congratulated by his colleagues openly on the floor of the senate, it being impossible to continue business for several minutes. While Senator Wolcott gives way to some other person on the commission, having tendered his resignation, it requiring more time than he is able to give to the subject, yet he still believes that international bimetalism will be realized, and says he will assist at any time to the end that this result may be accomplished. Senator Wolcott is a good republican and stands on the republican platform adopted at St. Louis.

The Gazette apologizes for making a second mention of a fact, that the Gazette is still the official paper of Morrow county, but this seems to become necessary because of a "how it happened" article in the Times. The Gazette had never been accused of giving away anything; in fact the main objection is and has been that it didn't do that kind of business and this shuts out some. But as a matter of fact, if any person thinks that the Gazette has been all wrong in this matter we would be pleased to have him call in and examine some trophies which will be kept, given this office by some of Heppner's leading business men and others showing some startling irregularities. If there is one paper being sent out by the Gazette without having been authorized we will be willing to give up the shop and walk out of town. And further, if any person wishes information as to circulation of both papers since the advent of our opposition, we refer them to the books of J. P. Williams, the postmaster of Heppner. So far this paper has not indulged in singing its own praise, but has let its friends do that part of it, and of these we have a few left, as some one told a mile from the Gazette office has learned.

NOTWITHSTANDING the persistent efforts of a portion of the democratic press to prevent contributions, the president's manly appeal for donations for the relief of the poor Cubans, who are suffering for the necessities of life by reason of the conditions on the island and not for any faults of their own, has touched the charitable hearts of the country and substantial relief is pouring into Cuba by every steamer. Arrangements have been made for Miss Clara Barton, president of the American Red Cross, to go to Cuba with a staff of assistants to help the U. S. consular agents in distributing the aid among the suffering. The president is much gratified at the prompt response of the country to his appeal for aid.

THE Gazette is in receipt of a copy of the Siam Free Press, published at Bangkok, of Nov. 15, 1897, which contains a full account of the settlement of the Kellott affair. Mr. E. V. Kellott, U. S. vice consular general, was assaulted by Siamese soldiers on the 19th of November, 1896, and Minister Barratt wanted a speedy settlement at the hands of the mixed commission, but was denied this. He at once sent for a U. S. gunboat, and the government dispatched the Machias. Upon its appearance the Siamese government got down to business at once, and the end of the whole affair is that Siam will apologize and pub-

licly degrade the guilty officers. It is a decided victory for Mr. Barratt who is the youngest minister ever appointed by Uncle Sam, and is now the youngest in the service of his country. He was appointed by President Cleveland while a reporter on the Portland Telegram, and he has made himself so useful to his country and so popular with American residents in Siam that not long ago he was endorsed by the entire American population of that country. Although a democrat, his worth as a representative of this great nation, his patriotism, his fealty, should be recognized. The Gazette hopes that he will be retained by the present administration.
