## PRINCE BECOMES A PRIEST.

Unfortunate Attachment for Princess Fe-  
dora of Schleswig-Holstein.

Prince Max of Saxony, who has re-  
cently taken up his abode in London as  
a Catholic priest at the Church of St.  
Boniface, Union street, Whitechapel, is  
the fourth son of Prince George, duke  
of Saxony, and nephew of the king of  
Saxony, says the New York Commer-  
cial Advertiser. When he became a  
priest he formally renounced all his  
rights to the throne to which his father  
is heir. Prince Max is only 26 years of  
age and he quitted the German army to  
enter a monastery a few years ago.

His determination to retire from the  
world and to enter the priesthood is  
said to be due to an unfortunate attach-  
ment he entertained for Princess  
Fedora of Schleswig-Holstein. By his  
modesty he has become very popular  
among the poor in the east-end. His re-  
ply to the cheers raised in his honor  
upon the occasion of his first visit to the  
"Gesellenverein," or workmen's  
club, attached to the mission, was:  
"I come among you not as a prince,  
but simply as a priest. I am a worker  
myself for, to my mind, no honor is so  
great as that of labor."
