A QUICK TRIP EAST.

Through a Picturesque Country to Boston. The Denver & Rio Grande railroad, the second line of the world, in connection with the Burlington, has arranged to change their time so as to give a 3 1/2 days service between Portland and Chicago, and less than five days between Portland and New York City. This is a reduction in time of eighteen hours and does away with the necessity of lay over at some point between Ogden and Denver.
