### A FEARFUL FALL.

A Young Man at Work on the Heppner Light & Water Co. Well Takes a Tumble.

Frank Pickett, employed to assist in sinking the well at the power house, fell into the well last evening a distance of 40 feet, striking the rock wall twice in the downward fall. He was going down to assist in drilling and in some manner unknown he missed getting his foot securely into the loop of the rope, he slipped to lower away, at the same instant swinging himself clear from the top. Mr. Myers heard him cry out and looked into the well saw him going down. A young man named Sheppard, was at the bottom of the well, and Pickett's feet struck him on the top of the head, cutting quite a gash but not seriously injuring him.

In a few minutes a large and excited crowd gathered around the well, and Messrs. Fryn and Ennes went down and fastened the rope to Pickett so that he could be hoisted out. He was taken to the Palace hotel where Dr. McSwains examined him.
