**SPANISH INFANTRY.**

New York, March 3.—The Journal's Havana cable says: "Here is the story which will be told Sampson's committee as soon as it opens its investigation in Havana. The Maine was blown up by a submarine mine. It was of Spanish construction, set by Weyler's Spaniards and exploded by their hands. Proof will uncover the question of Weyler's complicity. The plot will be traced to Madrid."

In Havana, the home of the plot, was a ship chandlery store called El Navio (the navy). Its owner is named Garcia Trino, whose rank is colonel of the volunteers. This Trino was the leader of a band of Spanish assassins, who sunk the Maine, all Weylerites, all opposed to Sagasta, Blanco and autonomy; all "Yankeesters."

"Garcia Trino is not now in Havana. He fled to Spain on the first boat which left after the Maine went down. Three of the seven are still here. The names of these three will be told to Sampson."

"It was not an original harbor mine which sank the Maine. It was placed beneath the Maine after she was swung to the harbor buoy. The mine, with all its riggings, was obtained from the Spanish transport La Gaska, whose mission is to carry explosives and what else is needed of the war sort to Port Arsenale at Havana. In the employ of Garcia Trino were three Spanish divers of the government corps."

"Their names were Alvarez and Abella. Two were brothers—the Alvarez. These three placed the mine and the rigging needed to make it hell's work beneath the keel of the Maine. One of the Alvarez pair has not been seen since. He became loquacious, in a faint-finding way, following the sinking of the Maine. He did not receive the \$5000 which was to have been his reward, and so he took to drink, made threats and half told the awful tale of murder."

"This Alvarez was immediately told to come aboard the Spanish warship Alfonso, and go down and inspect her bottom. He has not been in Havana since."

"Dead men will tell no tales" is the Spanish maxim. All agree who tell of it, that the mine was placed one night and fired the next, and there are those who declare that the mine was exploded from the stern of the Alfonso XIII."

**COOKING FOR THE SICK.**

Food for Convalescents should be Carefully Prepared and Diligently Served.

Mrs. B. T. Rorer lays down these rules for "Cooking for the Sick and Convalescents" in the Ladies' Home Journal: "In cooking for the sick a modern heat is necessary to bring out and intensify, rather than destroy or keep within, the delicate flavorings of the materials used. When receipts call for butter it must be added to hot dishes after they have been taken from the fire. All fried things must be avoided."

"Gruels, or semi-starchy foods require long, slow cooking. Meats must be cooked, but not overdone. Under no circumstances should raw meats, raw beef juice, or raw beef tea be used. Pasteurization is necessary to remove the danger of disease germs."

"Serve hot foods hot; cold foods cold. This does not mean the extreme of either."

"In arranging the tray keep everything as dainty as possible, using white or very pale colors. A simple vase of flowers, with not too decided an odor, will prove an additional attraction."

Rose, violets, lilies-of-the-valley or bougainvillea are advisable for their distinctness and absence of heavy odor."
