tle one enveloped in flames. She extri-
cated the flames as soon as possible,
but they had spread entirely over the
body making deep burns. The child died
about noon.

Eagle Valley R. R.
From the Baker Republican:

At a recent meeting a number of
changes were made in the directorship
of the Baker and Eagle Valley Railway
company. Mr. S. H. Reeves, of the
Sagamore hotel, was chosen president.
Messrs. P. Basche and John Waterman
were added to the board of directors.

The formation of the above mentioned
incorporated company has excited inter-
est in a railroad to the Seven Devils
country. Whether Baker City will be
the terminus as a connecting point with
the O. R. & N. system remains to be
seen. There are already four surveying
parties in the field sizing up the situa-
tion and endeavoring to discover the
most feasible route. If the business
men of this city are anxious for the road
they will have to stir themselves.

A TERRIBLE TRAGEDY.
Louis Gebhardt Kills His Wife, and Then
Shoots Himself.

From The Dalles Chronicle:
News was received here to-day of a
shooting tragedy which occurred at Cas-
cade Locks last night. Louis Gebhardt,
of that place, murdered his aged wife
and then blew out his own brains.

Gebhardt had the reputation of being
a man of bad disposition and violent
temper, and at various times he is said
to have uttered threats against his wife.
Of late he has not been feeling well, and
it is thought that he became mentally
unbalanced. A bad quarrel was found on
Mrs. Gebhardt's head, which might have
been made with a club, and the
supposition is that he struck her on the
head and stunned her, and then, fearing
that her injuries might prove fatal, he
ended the terrible deed by shooting her
through the breast, and then, placing
the gun to his mouth, ended his miser-
able existence by blowing out his brains.
In both cases death seemed to have been
almost instantaneous.

Gebhardt was about 72 years of age,
while his wife was several years younger.
At times he acted as if he were jealous
of his wife and showed in many ways
that he was not of sound mind.

Mrs. Gebhardt was known to all to be
a woman of good character and was
highly respected by all who knew her.
Coroner Batta left for the scene of the
tragedy to-day, and will, in all probabili-
ty, return this evening, when a more
accurate account can be got.
