After four days of labor the "silver" forces got together down at Portland the past week and put up the following state ticket:

GOVERNOR—Will R. King, populist, of Baker county.

SECRETARY OF STATE—Harrison R. Kincaid, silver-republican, of Lane county.

TREASURER—J. O. Booth, democrat, of Josephine county.

SUPREME JUDGE—W. M. Ramsey, democrat, Yamhill county.

ATTORNEY-GENERAL—J. L. Story, populist, of Wasco county.

PRINTER—C. A. Fitch, populist, of Clackamas county.

SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION—H. S. Lyman, populist, of Clatsop county.

CONGRESSMEN—First District: Robert M. Veatch, democrat, of Douglas county; Second District: C. M. Donaldson, silver-republican, of Baker county.

First judicial district—For judges, John A. Jeffrey, populist, of Jackson, and E. C. Wade, silver-republican, of Josephine; for district attorney, A. N. Soliss, democrat, of Jackson; for member of the board of equalization, Chas. E. Worden, democrat, of Jackson.

Second judicial district—For judge, J. W. Hamilton, democrat, of Douglas; for district attorney, Henry Denlinger, jr., populist, of Lincoln.

Third district—For judges, R. P. Boise, populist, of Marion, and P. H. D'Arcy, democrat, of Marion; for district attorney, Samuel N. Hayden, democrat, of Marion; for member of the board of equalization, J. P. Robinson, populist, of Marion.

Fourth district, Multnomah county nominations not ratified.

Fifth district—For judge, W. D. Hare, of Washington; for district attorney, George Nolan, democrat, of Clatsop; for member of the board of equalization, William Barlow, silver-republican, of Clackamas.

Sixth district—For district attorney, J. T. Hinkle, judge holds over.

Seventh district—For judge, W. L. Bradshaw, silver-republican; for district attorney, A. Van Vactor, populist; for member of the board of equalization, O. P. King, populist, of Sherman.

Eighth district—For district attorney, Samuel White, democrat, of Baker; judge holds over.

Ninth district—For judge, Morton D. Clifford, democrat, of Grant; for district attorney, Erret Hicks, populist, of Grant; for member of the board of equalization, J. R. Gregg, populist, of Malheur.

The joint senators and representatives are as follows:

Clackamas and Marion—For joint senator, Rev. H. L. Barkley, silver-republican, of Marion.

Baker and Malheur—For joint senator, William Smith, populist, of Baker.

Grant, Morrow and Harney—For joint representative, William Morrow, democrat, of Morrow.

Yamhill and Tillamook—For joint representative, T. J. Lucie, democrat, of Yamhill.

Wasco and Sherman—For joint senator, C. L. Morse, populist, of Wasco, and for joint representative, Brigham, of Wasco.

Lake and Klamath—For joint representative, J. B. Griffith, populist, of Klamath.

The nominations of circuit judge and district attorney in Multnomah county are still unsettled. The populists have not ratified the democratic nominations Thomas O'Day and J. V. Beach or the silver-republican nominations of Dell Stuart, for circuit judge. Nor have they named a candidate for district attorney, the position which was allotted to them by the conference committee.

They refuse to accept the nomination of J. V. Beach. They do not believe that he is a thorough silver man or that he is in sympathy with the aims of the union platform, though he has agreed to stand on it. Several influential members of the delegation declare that the democrats must withdraw his name and substitute one of their party who is more acceptable. They have not yet named a candidate for district attorney, because such material is scarce in the populist ranks. The executive committee of the state central committee was empowered to ratify the ticket by the state convention whenever the delegation from Multnomah county should agree upon it.
