SOLD 19,000 HEAD.

Big Sheep Deal Completed by Marshall & Farnish—Buying Horses For Alaska.

One of the largest transactions in sheep that ever occurred in Umattilla county has just been negotiated between Marshall & Farnish, extensive Umattilla county sheep-raisers, and Frank Lacy, a buyer from the east.

Nineteen hundred head, principally yearling ewes and wethers are embraced in the deal. The sheep are scattered in different bands all over the county, and will be delivered at Marshall & Farnish's Combs' canyon ranch, 15 miles south-west of Pendleton, about the middle of May, after shearing. The terms are private, but it is understood that the price was in the neighborhood of \$2.50 per head.

The sheep will comprise part of a big drive to be started this spring by Mr. Lacy for the eastern markets.

Are Buying Horses.

Marshall & Farnish have been engaged of late in buying work horses in their vicinity for a load shipment to Alaska and have nearly completed their purchases. The horses are good animals weighing between 1300 and 1400 pounds, and command from \$75 to \$150 per spav. They were ordered from Marshall & Farnish by the Dyea Transportation & Tramway Co., whose system is now in operation on the Chilcoot pass. They will be shipped via Seattle.—E. O.
