PRESS COMMENT. We are ready for war today. In that event, our first step would be to blockade Havana. This would confine the 60,000 Spanish troops now in Cuba to the island; would cut off all hope of reinforcements from Spain.

RESOLUTIONS DECLARING WAR. Introduced by Rawlins, Foraker and Frye. Washington, March 29.—Rawlins, of Utah, today introduced a joint resolution in the senate recognizing the independence of Cuba and declaring war against Spain.

Situation in Havana Critical. Chicago, March 29.—A special to the Chronicle from Washington says: General Lee has cabled the state department that the situation in Havana is critical. There is danger, he says, of riots growing out of the intense feeling among Weylerites against Americans.

Early Lambs Will Suffer. Not much damage to the wheat and fruit interests is feared, but there will probably be a considerable loss of early lambs from the snow and cold weather, says the Pendleton East Oregonian. Charles Cunningham, at his ranch three miles above Pilot Rock, was communicated with at noon today over the Blue Mountain telephone wire.
