Long Reigns.
According to the "Gotha Almanac," which has just been issued for 1894, the queen of England has reigned longer than any other ruler in the world, having ascended the throne in 1817. Next to her in point of time are Emperor Francis Joseph of Austria and Frederick, the grand duke of Baden. The monarchs who have reigned the shortest time are Prince Friedrich of Waldeck and Duke Alfred of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha. The oldest monarch, according to the "Almanac," is the pope, who is more than eighty-three years of age. The grand duke of Luxembourg and the king of Denmark, respectively seventy-six and seventy-five years of age, stand next to him in this regard. Grand Duke Karl Alexander, who lives in Weimar, is fourth in point of age, and Queen Victoria, with her seventy-four years, is the fifth oldest monarch. The youngest crowned heads are the little queen of the Netherlands, who is thirteen, and the king of Spain, who is seven and a half year old.
