WAR NEWS!

NEW YORK, April 26.—The vessel brought in by the Mangrove is supposed to be the transport, Monsterrat. The gunboat, Newport, has also captured two prizes.

HONG KONG, April 26.—The Philippine island insurgents are surrounding Manila.

HAVANA, April 26.—Gen. Blanco cables Madrid that he can defend Havana without the Spanish warships.

WASHINGTON, April 25.—So far the U. S. has captured nine Spanish boats. The U. S. has cut the Havana cable ten miles out. The end of the cable is now on the cruiser Mangrove. This cuts Blanco off from Spain. The war department has called on the states for their quota of volunteers. It took the house 1 minute and 41 seconds to pass a declaration of war. The flying squadron is still at Hampton Roads, except the Minneapolis and Columbia which are out at sea on a secret mission. The Oregon and Marietta are expected at Rio Janeiro in a few days. The government is preparing to land in Cuba 30,000 Springfield rifles, artillery guns and ammunition.

WASHINGTON, April 25.—Licut. Orri-awes, the night before leaving here, was challenged Gen. Lee and Capt. Sigbee to duel because they testified that the Maine was wrecked by Spaniards. He said that he would wait eight days for them at Toronto.

TACOMA, April 25.—Wheat went up to \$1 and closed at 97 cents.

WASHINGTON, April 25.—The war revenue taxes "long distance" telephones.

SPOKANE, April 26.—Gov. Rogers calls supplies and equipments of artillery for volunteers from this state. Will battle at his own expense.

PORTLAND, April 25.—(Tribune Special.)—Secy. Sherman's resignation has been accepted and Judge Day will likely take the state department portfolio. The resolution of the senate committee provided that a state of war existed between the United States and Spain when the Spanish government handed Woodford his passports, April 21st. The United States gives the Spanish vessels five days to leave American ports, in compliance with international law. John Jacob Astor offers to equip out a regiment free of cost to the government. John A. Logan jr. will raise a regiment.

The Surgeon General issued orders calculated to prevent yellow fever in Cuba among the volunteers. The president calls on the governor of Oregon for one regiment of volunteers to rendezvous at Portland.

WASHINGTON, April 25.—(Tribune Special.)—A resolution formally declaring war will be introduced in congress today. Spain has made a formal reply to our ultimatum which is a virtual declaration of war. The war department is making arrangements to transport troops to Cuba. The insurgents will be given transports to Cuba, and as soon as possible, made fit to co-operate with our fleet. They will not be expected to do any fighting while we are getting our volunteers ready.

MADRID, April 25.—(Tribune Special.)—The government will oppose privateering when considered necessary, and has practically made a formal declaration that war exists.

HAVANA, April 25.—(Tribune Special.)—Bulletins declaring the armistice ended have been posted for several days. Troops are being concentrated at the sea coast town and the interior towns have been ordered burned. The island will be devastated before the Americans arrive.

SPOKANE, April 25.—(Tribune Special.)—Licut. Holly, of Seattle, Military instructor for the state of Washington, will probably be appointed colonel of the First Regt., Washington volunteers.

ON BOARD THE NEW YORK. HAVANA, April 25.—(Tribune Special.)—Last night Moro Castle fired ten shots at the battleship New York without effect. Not a shot was returned. The torpedo boat, Porter, is doing great work. If she continues, the crew will have a large amount of prize money.

KEY WEST, April 23.—The Spanish steamer Pedro was captured yesterday by the United States cruiser New York, between Key West and Havana. The report was circulated all over the United States that the vessel captured was the Alphonso XIII.

LONDON, April 23.—The Spaniards have captured the American ship Shenandoah off the coast of Spain.

THE PARIS EVIDENTLY SAFE. The report that the Spanish had captured the big American liner Paris is not credited here. The Paris was one of the fastest mail steamers that plied the atlantic. Her average speed was 27 knots an hour, and there is no vessel in the Spanish navy that could keep within sight of her.

PORTLAND, April 23 (Tribune Dispatch, 2:05 p. m.)—The blockade of Cuban ports is now complete. The plan for occupying the island with troops is now being rapidly perfected. The gunboat, Nashville, captured the Heuna Ventura yesterday morning and took it to Key West. Two shots were fired by the Nashville. Ventura immediately surrendered. The arrival at Key West of the first prize caused great demonstration. Another Spanish steamer was caught late yesterday and by torpedo boats was taken to Key West.

The United States has virtually annexed Hawaii. This seizure is made for advantage in the present conflict. The Spanish can secure no coal there.

The McKinley cabinet will reorganize immediately. Sherman has resigned and is succeeded by Judge Day. Gage, secretary of the treasury, will resign.

The president's proclamation calls for 125,000 volunteers for two years. Much anxiety is expressed for the battleship Oregon. She is not yet safe.

The Paris, en route from Southampton, may have been captured by the Spanish. She is loaded with munitions of war. Naval reserves of Michigan, Maryland, New Jersey, Massachusetts have been assigned, respectively, to the Yosemite, Dixie, Yankee and Prairie.

Latest news from Havana states that an engagement occurred in Havana harbor between land batteries and American warships.

By phone it is learned that the New York captured the Spanish flotilla, No. 12, taking 10,000 prisoners. Another telephone report, which is expected to be verified this afternoon, says that an American warship captured, today, the big Spanish warship, Alphonso XIII. The particulars of the engagement can not be given at present, but several shots were fired before the Spaniards surrendered. If this is true, all the plans of the Spaniards are in the hands of the Americans, as this was the flagship of the fleet.

GRANITE NEWS.

J. E. Cannon, of the Success Mine, is in Baker City.

From the Baker City Republican: Mr. J. E. Cannon, who owns interests in the Success, Property and many other claims near Granite, Grant county, has been in Baker City for a few days, and will return to his mines early next week, accompanied by his wife.

Since Mr. Cannon's arrival here he received the news that Charles Rollins, his partner in the Prosperity mine, had died. Mr. Rollins became overheated while removing a wheelbarrow from one mine to another. He fell and expired almost immediately. His funeral took place at Granite on Tuesday, the large attendance giving evidence of the esteem in which he was held. Mr. Rollins was a native of Maine and had no relatives in this section.

Mr. Cannon says that parties from Spokane, Baker City and other points are only awaiting the going off of the snow to go into the Granite country and boom things in the mining line.
