WASHINGTON, D. C., April 27.-It is believed that Havana will be seized by America. Trocha Pruesto Principe has been abandoned by Spanish troops. Santa Cruz powder mill has been set on fire and blown up. Steamer Majestic reports passing the Paris at sea.
