FUSION SPEAKING.

Hon. W. R. King Addressed the People
of Heppner at the Opera House Saturday
Afternoon.

According to promise Hon. W. R.
King, fusion candidate for governor,
addressed the people of Heppner last
Saturday afternoon. Although the silver
people of Heppner had attempted to
advertisise the meeting, the number who
turned out was entirely too small, con-
sidering the fact that the leading candi-
date of one of the great parties was to
open his campaign on this occasion. A
great many in the audience were republi-
cans, and to their credit they remained
loyal to their party, something that
cannot be said for some of our
fusion friends who attended the evening
meeting of the Morrow County Republi-
can Club.

coursed sweet music, after which the
speaker was introduced by Hon. J. W.
