WAR NEWS!

KEY WEST, May 11.-A mob this morning burned a number of large grain archouses at Havana.

The cruiser Charleston is ordered to leave San Francisco at once with supplies and ammunition for Admiral Dewey and his fleet.

GIBRALTER, May 11.-A British steamer reports officially that she passed a Spanish torpedo boat destroyer yesterday evening. Shortly after passing, her lights were entinguished and a terrific explosion was followed by her disappearance. Evidently her boilers had exploded. All on board were lost.

NE W YORK, May 11.—The naval board is convinced that the Spanish squadron has returned to Spain and that Spain has lost hope of effectively resisting the loss

Sampson's fleet will be brought back to take part in the invasion of Cuba. Porto Rico will be left alone for the present.

Spain is said to be preparing an expedition against Dewey. Spain needs all the soldiers she can muster, but owing to the insurrection at home they are hard to

Cigarette smokers will not be accepted as United States volunteers.

Congress is divided as to whether to hold or sell the Phillipines.

TACOMA, May 11.-Two companies from Spokane and two from Scattle left ere this afternoon on steamer Senator for San Francisco. Others will follow.

ST. THOMAS, West Indies, May 12.-Wild papie in Porto Rico. The people are crezed over the prospects of hombardment. Washington agent at Temps just old price of 25 cents and upwards. The in from Gen. Gomez's army says Cubane have 25,000 armed men to put in the field agreement heretofore entered into by and 15,000 more that need arms and ammunition.

LONDON, May 12-Madrid despatches says: Spanish government demands \$100,000,000 to carry on war. May not get it.

WASHINGTON, May 12-General Miles and staff leave this afternoon for Tampa, Florida.

HAVANA, May 11-Four armed vessels of the United States opened fire on Cienfuegos, Cuba, Wednesday, and attempted to land men and arms in barges. Spanish troops assisted by forts drove off the invaders and destroyed cable tation. Second attempt also frustrated. It is rumored that the Americans lost heavily. Spanish loss, only 14 wounded.

LONDON, May 12.-It is reported that at Milan 1 000 men were arrested, 600 killed and 1,000 wounded. Riot resolution declared imminent.

WASHINGTON, May 12 .- All the United States volunteers and regulars have been ordered to move by the last of the week, either to San Francisco or Tampa, for embarkation either to the Phillipines or Cubs.

Nothing more has been heard from Sampson's squadron. The whereabouts of the Spanish Cape Verde fleet is also unknown to the United States.

Startling developments are expected at any time owing to the mysterious

KEY WEST, May 12.—In an engagement near Matanzas yesterday in which the orniser Wilmington, torpedo boat Winslow and ----- boat Hudson were engaged, one officer and three men kill and several wounded. The Hudson has arrived here wi'h bodies.

Captain Barnard, of the Hudson, seriously wounded in the leg, but it is thought

will survive. NEW YORK, May 12.- Dewey has been ordered to destroy all strange vessels and fortifications in the Phillipines, removing all danger to United States com-

The United States torpedo boat Winslow has been badly crippled. Four of the crew were killed in a terrific battle with Spanish ships and forts in Cardena harbor. The Hudeon dragged the helpless Winslow out of danger.

WASHINGTON, May 12 .- Downey, a Spanish spy, arrested several days ago, has committed suicide.

Commander Reeny wires from Key West that the Winslow is badly damaged and will be sent here as soon as temporary repairs can be made.

A Hong Kong dispatch says that after a four hours' fight, the United States cruiser Concord, one of Dewey's fleet, destroyed the Spanish war ship Illica, with all on board.

NEW YORK, May 12.—American vessels are bombarding Salzann, Porto Rico.

The navy department is informed that there are a number of Spanish torpedo boats off the coast of New England.

LONDON, May 13 .- A special from Madrid today says that Berneigo admitted Thursday evening that the Cape Verde squadron was at Cape de France, Martineque, about 400 miles south of Porto Rico. A Madrid dispatch from Martineque to the Heraldo confirms the report of the arrival there of the Cape Verde equadron under Admiral Cevenza.

KEY WEST, May 13 .- A dispatch boat from Havana says that the blockade is complete and that everything is quiet there. It is now known that the Winslow, Wilmington and Hudson created great bavoc at Cardena. A large part of the town is on fire. It is thought that one gunboat and one torpedo boat of the Spanish fleet were destroyed.

MADRID. May 13-Despatch from Havana says, at 8 o'clock yesterday morning three large and three small American vessels appeared off the coast of Cardense. Small boats were attached to marines which landed near fort, which was seen. Septamore was seized and coast guards made prisoners. Spanish gunboat at Lopaz was badly disabled.

KEY WEST, May 13-Auxiliary boat Hudson's men believe they fought against concealed batteries as well as gupbost batteries. About the same time a Cardenss engagement was bad. American ship Machine shot away batteries at

American torpedo boat Winslow badly disabled and towed nine miles into Cardens by the Hudson. The crew says the Wilmington will sgain bombard Cardens today.

PORT AU PRINCE, May 13 .- Sampson, with nine warships, arrived at San Juan Porto Rico. At sunrise this morning the battleship Iows fired the first shot at the fort with disastrous effect. Battlaship Indiana followed. Fortress responded feebly. Spanish steamer Reta bus powe captured by the United States vessel Yale. Thousands of the population, together with the foreign consuls, sought refugs in ply to your muscles and other organs

Capture of Havana expected not later than tomorrow. Troops in large numbers beginning to strive on the island.

MAURID, May 18-11 p. m .- Senor Morea, secretary of colonies, and Senor Gullon, foreign minister, have resigned. Admiral Bonnego and Count Xiquen, minister of public works, have also resigned.

HOW LAKE TAHOE WAS FORMED.

The Result of Volcanie Upheaval in an Age Long Gone By. Maj. J. W. Powell, director of the

United States geological survey, thus describes the origin of Lake Tahoe: "In geographical times not long ago, as speaks the scientist, but very long ago, as speaks the chronicler of human follies, there was a deep valley on the eastern slope of the Sierra Nevadas at the headwaters of the Truckee river. About this valley towered granite mountains. But earthquakes came, rents were opened in the rocks, and from the fissures poured monstrous streams of lava. One of those fissures crossed the lower end of the valley, and through it poured floods of molten rocks. Stream after stream issued, to cool in solid sheets and blocks, until a wall was built across the valley two or three thousand feet in height, and above it was a deep basin five or six hundred square miles in area. The storms that fell on the granite and volcanic mountains rolled in rivers to fill the basin, and Lake Tahoe was created. When filled at last its waters overflowed the rim of lava, and the Truckee river now springs from the Tahoe fountain. Its deep waters are dark with profundity, like the clouds of a stormy sky, but about its shores a few shallow bays are found, and emerald waters, like festoons of beauty, encircle the deeper and more somber lake. Back from the waters forestclad slopes rise toward the heavens, and above are seen naked crags and domes of granite.
