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WAR NEWS!

WASHINGTON, May 13.—Admiral Sampson telegraphed St Thomas: a portion of my squadron made a three hours' attack on San Juan resulting in much damage to the batteries and city adjacent to batteries. One man killed on board the New York and several slightly wounded. No damage to my ships.

MADRID, May 13.—It is reported that a strong Spanish expedition is being organized to attack the Philippines. Cape Verde's fleet leaves Martinique immediately under sealed orders.

WASHINGTON, May 14.—Admiral Sampson did not take Porto Rico because he had no force to hold it with. In three hours' continued firing the Spanish gunners hit the American ships but twice.

NEW YORK, May 13.—A World dispatch from Washington says: A diplomatic completion between the United States and the French government is suggested by this question, which is agitating naval experts: "Did French experts mean the guns that carried death to five American sailors of the torpedo boat Winslow?"

TAMPA, Fla., May 14.—It is reported that the sighting of the Spanish fleet will probably cause a postponement of the embarkation of troops for Cuba, and that they will be held until the fleet is destroyed.

KEY WEST, May 14.—In an engagement at Cienfuegos, Wednesday, one sailor on board the American ship Marblehead killed and six wounded. The Spanish loss was great.

MADRID, May 14.—Spanish reports admit that the Spanish loss at the engagement at Manila was 300 killed and 600 wounded. Dewey completely annihilated the Spanish fleet.

WASHINGTON, May 14.—The Spanish fleet has been sighted about 100 miles off the coast of Venezuela. SAN FRANCISCO, May 15.—The cruiser Charleston leaves for Manila today with 300 sailors and marines to reinforce Dewey.

KEY WEST, May 15.—The Spanish squadron started out of Curacao, West Indies, near Venezuela. The purpose of the Spanish admiral is to elude Sampson and get into Havana harbor.

TAMPA, May 14.—Officials believe that the time for the invasion of Cuba is at hand. All of the regular army will be here Monday. The government has the transports ready. A scheme for co-operating with the insurgents is completed.

KEY WEST, May 15.—It is thought here that the American fleet will meet the Spanish squadron Tuesday. The Oregon will have joined Sampson by that time and will materially strengthen the squadron, which is quite strong enough now to master the Spaniards.

A large number of rifles and many thousand rounds of ammunition have been landed in Cuba and these munitions of war, together with valuable stores, are now safely in the hands of the insurgents.

WASHINGTON, May 15.—It is reported that a member of a plot to kill General Lee, a man named Gonzales, was arrested in Washington today. It is definitely known that such a plot is in existence and enough evidence has been secured to connect Gonzales with it.

OFF HAVANA, May 14.—Blanco again tried to entice the American ships under the guns of the Spanish forts at Havana. He sent out two steamers, as decoys, but they were chased back by American torpedo boats.

Sagasta will establish a new ministry which will be for war to the bitter end. The reconcentrados in Havana are almost all dead. The Spanish have driven them from Havana, without food, and they dropped dead on the road.

The situation in Havana is desperate. If the blockade is not raised red riot will run supreme. Some Spaniards say they will blow up and set fire to the cities before they will surrender to the Americans.

It is rumored that Germany will seize the island of Hayti as soon as the Spanish fleet engages the Americans. HAYTI, May 14.—Sampson's squadron is uncertain whether to go southward to look for the Spanish fleet or go to the west.

Spanish refugees from Cuba say that there are 60,000 troops there and that the hospitals are crowded with sick and wounded soldiers. The defenses about Havana have been materially strengthened.

CHARLESTON, S. C., May 16.—The flying squadron has arrived here and is anxiously awaiting the arrival of coal to continue her journey. The transports will continue southward to Key West.

MADRID, May 16.—The Spaniards declare that Lord Chamberlain's speech will provoke war in Europe, and have prepared a note to the powers, asking them to combine against England and America.
