WAR NEWS.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 20.—In three days a California regiment of volunteers will be on their way to Manila on the City of Pekin. The Charleston, which returned to repair its boilers, will sail within 48 hours. Two regiments of regulars have received orders to go to Manila.

MADRID, May 20.—The Spanish squadron arrived at Santiago de Cuba without accident. It is rumored that the Spanish fleet has entered the Spanish harbor.

CHICAGO, May 20.—A special to the Journal says that 10,000 troops will be sent to Hawaii to occupy the island and act as a reserve in case Dewey shall ask for more men in the Philippines.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, May 20.—The insurgents are concentrating an army here, the object being to cut off the food supply.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, May 20.—Two American warships appeared off Santiago de Cuba yesterday and drew the fire from shore batteries to ascertain their location. This incident gave rise yesterday to the rumors of the bombardment of that place.

WASHINGTON, May 20.—The authorities admit their inability to properly equip troops in a hurry. They predict that war will be prolonged probably for six months. The navy is ready at any time to transfer troops to the Cuban coast.

CHICAGO, May 20.—Seventy dead victims of the cyclone are recorded in Iowa, Illinois and Wisconsin.

The cooling station secured by the Spanish, referred to in yesterday's dispatches, is that of St. Pierre, a French, not an English colony. It looks as if France were openly assisting Spain, and trouble is expected.

THE service given on the Heppner branch is something terrible. The car that has been sent here for use as a passenger coach is worse than a cattle car. As a matter of necessity the hours for getting in and out of Heppner are bad, but with the kind of accommodations given it is now wretched. A petition should be circulated by our citizens asking for better accommodations.

THE appointment of Hon. J. C. Bridges to the position of register of the land office at Roseburg is pleasing to all of Joe's friends. Joe was a member of the legislature in 1895, and was a consistent advocate of Hon. J. N. Dolph for re-election, staying with him until the last moment, when he went to McBride and thus made the 45th man, which was necessary for a selection. In the attempted session of '97 he was always a friend of Senator Mitchell and bitterly opposed to the hold-up methods. His selection is a just reward to an honorable, upright man.

A COMPILATION of the warrants from the clerk's office of Multnomah county shows that Glass & Prudhomme, during Judge Northup's forty-five months as judge, was paid the sum of \$10,969.98, while all other printing firms in Portland for that time received less than one-fourth of that amount by two per cent. The house of Glass & Prudhomme is one of the smallest in Portland. Why does this condition of things exist? Glass is Simon's tool. Simon nominated Northup four years ago; caused him to be nominated for congress against Ellis two years ago; Northup owes his present nomination to Simon.

GEMS FROM MULTNOMAH.

A Few Things Picked up Here and There. From the County Judge.

The election law of Oregon says that when the county court appoints the judges of election they shall be three capable and discreet persons possessing the qualifications of electors, who shall not all be of the same political party, and shall appoint two suitable persons to act as clerks who likewise shall be of different political faith. Rising superior to this law comes Judge Northup, and not only appoints the whole lot of judges and clerks from the republican party, but all from the wing that is dominated and controlled by and in the interest of Joe Simon. How do the voters like it? Is H. H. Northup greater than the law? Has he special rights which the law is bound to respect, or is he subject to its action the same as the rest of the people? He held up his hand before God and swore he would uphold and obey the law, and yet he overrides it flagrantly in hundreds of ways. Awry with him!

Section 2 of the election law of the state of Oregon provides that the county court shall establish the county precincts of the county, and states that no precinct shall contain more than 250 electors, as nearly as can be ascertained by the court.

There are a number of precincts in this county having a great many more electors than permitted by the above law, and yet Judge Northup refuses to make any new precincts or open any new polling places, Precinct No. 9 in this city now has over 1200 electors, which condition of affairs has been

called to his attention, but no steps have been taken by him to comply with the law, by creating new precincts and polling places and reducing the number of voters as required.

It is needless to say this precinct always returns a large majority against Joe Simon, Northup's political boss. He does not care whether 500 or 600 voters are unable to exercise their elective franchise on account of lack of voting facilities, particularly when his boss would get pinched in a free and full vote. Do the voters want a county judge to look out for the interests of Joe Simon, or one who will serve the people, and himself comply with the laws he is elected to enforce?
