HONG KONG, May 25.—Rioting is going on in Manila. Half the town is in flames. Archbishop of Manila has announced that four Spanish battleships are nearing the city.

WASHINGTON, May 25.—The report is again current that Secretary Alger will resign owing to ill health. SAN FRANCISCO, May 25.—Troop ships, City of Pekin, City of Sidney and Australia will probably leave at 3 p. m. today.

WASHINGTON, May 25.—As soon as Gen. Merritt sails next week, preparations will be made for the third expedition of 10,000 men for the Philippine. The president has issued a call for 75,000 more volunteers, according to population of the states.

KEY WEST, May 26.—A dispatch boat from Santiago arrived today. Schley's fleet has been left outside guarding Cervera's fleet which is inside. Sampson's fleet is off Havana and the invasion of Cuba will now undoubtedly begin at once.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 26.—Troop ships for Manila sailed at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon amid great enthusiasm. Manila advices say that the lieutenant-commander of the Spanish gunboat, Callao, has been shot after a court martial trial and Admiral Montejó is sentenced to the same fate.

WASHINGTON, May 26.—The war department is now engaged on plans for the invasion of Porto Rico. KEY WEST, May 26.—Sampson's fleet has seized a big coal deposit at Cayo, a French possession. It was left there by German colliers for the Spanish fleet.

MADRID, May 26.—Manila advices say that Americans landed arms and ammunition at Binlayas. The Spanish captured the supplies and drove the Americans back with great loss. GIBRALTAR, May 26.—A consignment of forty Krupp guns for fortifications or battleships reached Spain from Essen, Prussia.

WASHINGTON, May 26.—The cruiser Baltimore is reported disabled at Manila. No lives lost. A gigantic movement of troops in the direction of Cuba has begun. The Oregon has been ordered to join Sampson at Havana. The Spaniards attempted to blow up the Oregon at Rio Janeiro. Thirty bombs were found in coal taken aboard there.
